Tire Output Cannot Be Uppeped, ODT Head States
CLEVELAND, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Despite an adequate supply of rubber "there is no remedy in sight for our heavy-duty tire problem" before early next year, Col. J. Monroe Johnson, director of the office of defense transportation, declared yesterday.

"Tire production is at a peak," said Johnson, "but we simply can't seem to enlarge our tire production facilities."

The rubber director, in an interview, blamed the tire shortage on "those responsible for allocating rubber to the heavy-duty section of the tire industry."

Ram Prices at Auction Far Under Those of '43
SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Western sheepmen held their bids under tight rein as they returned to the auction ring today for the second round of the 29th annual national ram sale.

Prices in yesterday's sales of Hampshire and Suffolk rams ran 20 percent lower than last year and the top of \$700 for an English-bred Hampshire ram was far under the \$3,300 high paid in 1943 for a Suffolk stud.

The top Suffolk yesterday brought \$400.

Sheepmen attributed the drop in prices to labor shortages, selling prices on meat and wool and uncertainty of postwar prices.

World Food Agency Faces Task of Boosting Output Without Creating Surpluses That Would Upset Prices

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The proposed international food and agriculture organization offers the world no magic formula for easing mankind's struggle for food and clothing.

No group is more aware of this than its author—the interim commission of the united nations food conference which met at Hot Springs, Va., last year. The conference directed the commission to draft plans for a postwar world food agency to help all nations eliminate hunger within their borders and to improve conditions for farmers.

The outline of such an agency was announced earlier this week by the commission. Reactions to the agency were mixed. Some persons hailed it as an instrument for blotting out hunger. Others expressed keen disappointment because the organization was given no powers whatsoever to protect farm prices.

These conflicting reactions reflect largely deep-seated differences of viewpoint as to the character of postwar food and agricultural problems. These differences might be tagged roughly consumer and producer viewpoints.

In simple words—consumers want plenty of food at cheap prices. Farmers, on the other hand, want to produce abundantly, but only at remunerative prices.

Broadly speaking, the consumer viewpoint of the future food problem is this: World food production must be expanded sharply if all persons are to have enough to assure them health sustaining diets. In other words, the task ahead is one of pushing production to levels never before reached.

The producer retorts: What you say is true, but what about prices and markets for expanded production? In the past, farmers have often been confronted with unmarketable surpluses and ruinously low prices. We fear the return of surpluses and low prices after military demands of the war disappear.

The consumer viewpoint sees the job of the international agency largely that of promoting increased production.

The producer viewpoint sees the task as largely one of stabilizing world markets and prices. Two-Way Task Faced

The world agency must represent both viewpoints and it must reconcile its seemingly dual responsibility.

As has been pointed out, the world agency, as proposed by the commission, would be an advisory organization only. Its job will be to show the world how to increase food production to limits required while at the same time outlining ways and means of assuring producers just returns.

The physical task of increasing production is the lesser part of the food organization's task. Science and technology will provide the answer here. The food agency's responsibility will be that of advising various nations how to apply these twin aides.

The bigger part of the job will be outside the scope of the food organization. Before agriculture can produce abundantly, consumers must have the money to buy its products. Money means jobs. A well-fed world must of necessity be a well-employed world.

Thus the formula for freeing the world from hunger must include not only prescriptions for increasing food production, but recipes for putting millions to work.

Supply of Tea Ample For Many Months, Report
NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The supply of tea in the United States at midyear totaled approximately 25,252,000 pounds, more than twice the supply on hand a year ago, Benjamin Wood, managing director of the tea bureau, announced yesterday.

"At the current rate of restricted consumption, which is 75 million pounds a year, or 25 million pounds under normal," Wood said, "this is enough tea to meet U. S. tea drinkers' needs for approximately four months—nearly enough to see us through to 1945."

Willkie Gets New White House Bid, Paper Declares

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The Herald-Tribune said today that President Roosevelt has "once again communicated with Wendell L. Willkie 'presumably to renew' an invitation for a conference on foreign policy."

The President told reporters last week that there was nothing, as far as he knew, to published reports concerning an initial invitation.

Willkie, questioned about the latest reported invitation, said: "Once again, no comment."

Reviewing the situation from the start, the Herald-Tribune said that White House emissaries who approached Willkie on a talk with the President, were told that he did not want to talk to Mr. Roosevelt, the democratic presidential candidate or the leader of the democratic party, but that he could not refuse to talk to the President of the United States, "providing that the talk wasn't to be about politics."

Later, on July 13, the newspaper said a letter went to Willkie from the White House saying that the President would like to discuss foreign policy with him, not politics.

In the past week, Stimson said, allied planes destroyed 2,279 railway cars of all kinds and destroyed or damaged more than 800 locomotives. Now they are concentrating on barges and small boats, while keeping up their attacks on German trucks, tanks and troops concentrations.

Names of Candidates Certified to Clerks
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 24.—(AP)—The state department mailed to county clerks yesterday the certification of candidates and measures for the November 7 general election in order to speed the delivery of ballots to members of the armed forces.

The list was mailed a month earlier than usual to permit clerks to set up their ballots. The deadline for filing by independent candidates is September 22, and on that day, the clerks can insert the handful of independents into the ballot forms and begin printing immediately.

Nazis Unable to Prolong Defense, Stimson States
WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Secretary Stimson said today allied military victories coupled with the rising of French forces have shattered German hopes of making a prolonged stand even in northern France. He told a news conference:

"On every side Germany weakens. Now is the time for us to muster all our strength and unity for the final blows."

"The liberation of Paris by the French people themselves after our own American forces had half-encircled the city is a fitting demonstration of the waning power of the nazis and the rebirth of freedom."

Stimson said that already the great bulk of metropolitan France has been liberated, for all practical purposes, by the combined actions of allied armies and the French people themselves. In the midst of success, he reminded it still is necessary to remember that a substantial number of divisions of the German Fifteenth army in the Calais area were not yet in combat. Standing north of the Scheldt river he said, they undoubtedly will seek to reorganize such Seventh army units as manage to escape from Normandy and increase their strength.

Stimson said the only area left

for a German attempt at a real defense is a region of the last war's battlefield in northern France. But the enemy's supply and reinforcement routes into this territory are under constant air patrol and attack, he added, as far as the interior of Belgium and the German border.
