THANKS FOR UMPQUA PARK

PURCHASE of Umpqua park by the Douglas county court as a site for revival of the annual county fair pleases us very much, personally.

We know that the county court arrived at its decision only after long deliberation. The study was made not only by the members of the court but by numerous advisers called in for the specific purpose of aiding in determination of the best possible procedure.

Many of us who know Umpqua park well have been fearful it would be lost for public use through development as a residential district. It is a most beautiful site for a subdivision and it is surprising that some speculator has not seized the opportunity to promote a fine homes project.

In fact, that was once the original purpose. James Christian Alexander came to Roseburg about the turn of the century at a time when subdivision projects were in their heyday.

Purchase of the property for public use has been too long delayed. The park affords exceptional recreational facilities. There is ample room for baseball diamonds, tennis courts and playgrounds.

We hope that eventually someone will recognize the soundness of the idea long advanced by A. C. Mursters, one of Douglas county's first citizens, who has urged restoration of the South Umpqua dam.

We can vision at some future date a bridge spanning the river to the site; a park for play, picnicking and just "plain-lazy" relaxing; athletic fields where competitive sports may be enjoyed.

We hope the proposed development will not be left entirely to the county court or the fair board. There are numerous organizations that can lend a hand.

Washington News From an Inside View

Argument, Sentiment, Comment

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 26.—We are still arguing with the War Production Administration officials here about removing ration points on all lamb and from the higher grades of beef also.

Early this week I attended a conference with Marvin Jones, war food administrator, which was attended also by congressmen from the states of Washington, Utah, Idaho and California.

When the senate passes its bill, the two bills will then be taken into a conference committee of house and senate members.

Speaking of surplus property—material and equipment no longer needed for war—some is available now.

Donald Nelson, long time head of the War Production board, has now been handed the customary new deal elimination routine.

What we would like to know is: What has become of the Constitution? Or is that a military secret, too?

Background of the WPB Shakeup (Salem Capital Journal). The intrigues which have characterized the Roosevelt admini-

stration all along and have recently resulted in the shake-up in the War Production board by the president sending Chairman Donald Nelson to China on a secret mission, the resignation of its vice chairman, Charles E. Wilson, and the appointment of Julius A. Krug, as acting chairman, are thus defined by David Lawrence, Washington correspondent and editor of the United States News as current among well informed senators on Capitol Hill.

What it all boils down to is the fact that certain New Dealers who have socialistic ideas about using the surplus property on a "production for use" basis in competition with industry are finally in control of policy in the board.

It turns out now that the plot to get Donald Nelson out of town was hatched by some of the ardent New Dealers themselves and their hope was to get rid of Wilson by aggravating him into a resignation while Nelson was away in China.

At any rate the intrigue succeeded and the New Dealers' candidate, Mr. Krug, was appointed to head the WPB. It is a victory for the little group whom Mr. Wilson charges with provoking dissension and whom Mr. Nelson refused to discharge—possibly because he was afraid of them himself.

Mr. Krug is a staunch New Dealer, one of the Wisconsin group who believe in public ownership. He was the chief engineer for the Tennessee Valley Authority and has been director general of priorities and vice-president in charge of WPB's program division for the last two years.

Now comes Mr. Byrnes, an "assistant President," who certainly was not elected to that high office by the people, and issues what he calls a "directive." That's just another name for an "order."
