**England Strafed By New Barrage Of Robot Bombs**

LONDON, Aug. 30—(AP)—American bombers, anti-aircraft fire and fighter pilots all were directed today against German robot bombs which kept hurtling the channel toward London and southern England.

One pilot shot down three before dusk. Ground fire brought down many more. The bombers attacked launching platforms in northern France.

Flight Lt. Rene Van Lierde, a Belgian, had piloted 27 bombs so far; another pilot had 50 and a third had downed 20. Many of the pilotless explosives have been destroyed by American fliers who have spotted them by chance while on other missions.

New waves of German flying bombs hurtled against London and southern England during the night, most of them apparently coming from the region west of Boulogne upon which allied armaments are rapidly advanced.

The assaults against the southern counties continued after daybreak and an alert also was sounded again in the London area.

The attacks ended a lull which had continued for two successive nights—a break believed due in part to German difficulties in transporting the robots to launching sites.

**New Threat Intimated**

During the night attack the southeast coast town of Folkestone shook and the earth rumbled to a distant explosion which some reports said was the heaviest shock felt there during the entire war. Most persons agreed that the explosions, shortly before midnight, occurred across the channel in France and there was some belief that the Germans might have been testing their long-threatened vengeance weapons.

A Stockholm dispatch meanwhile reported that all German papers had carried a cryptic article by War Reporter Joachim Fernau who wrote that German victory was "not only sure, but very near"—apparently an attempt to bolster German belief in the promised secret weapons still to come.

Despite heavy allied bombing the Germans are directing most of their robot attacks from the Pas de Calais area across the channel.

## Turkey Harboring Spies of Germany, Red Paper Claims

MOSCOW, Aug. 30—(AP)—The semi-official newspaper Pravda today accused Turkey of harboring German spies and turning her diplomatic break with the Allies into a "friendly rupture" with Russia.

With Russian troops closer to the Dardanelles than on any decision since the first World War, Pravda asserted German diplomatic, military, aviation and commercial attaches still were in Ankara 20 days after their scheduled departure.

The article carried the date line of Batum, nearest Russian Black Sea port to Turkey. Its significance could hardly be overemphasized.

At the same time the FCC reported a Moscow broadcast re-asserting to Sznajnski to oust the Franco-Franco regime and break with Germany "to gain a place for Spain among the democratic and freedom-loving nations."

It said France was a "willing host for all fascists who are trying to escape the people's justice."

The article charged that Nazi espionage and propaganda against the allies, especially against the Soviet Union, actually had increased since Turkey broke relations with the Allies; that German diplomats still held receptions attended by Turkish officials and representatives of German satellite governments.

**Nazis Not Restricted**

The article said some of the most important Turkish newspapers remained under German influence, and that Turkey allowed Nazi diplomats to mail official private correspondence through the Ankara post office to Germany. It said the German embassy personnel retained diplomatic licenses on their motor cars and rode freely about the capital.

The unbecoming picture of the servile attitude of Turkish authorities to the Hitlerite diplomats cannot help but provoke surprise," Pravda said, quoting "journalistic sources in Ankara that the Turks promised Nazi Ambassador Franz von Papen to keep all terms of the Turkish-German agreement of July, 1941.

## Island Pets Of Japanese Taken Over by Marines

SAIPAN, Marianas Islands (Delayed)—U. S. Marines' hatred for the Japs certainly does not extend to the thousands of domestic animals the Japs have left behind in their slow and hard-fought retreat northward.

When water was scarce, a marine was seen giving a dog a drink out of his canteen cup. Another marine drew water out a cistern for a particularly unlovely pair of swine. A Fourth marine division artillery unit adopted two Jap dogs, only to have them run off, apparently because they couldn't stand the artillery fire.

**Carabao Haul Supplies**

Carabao of which there are hundreds here to till the fields, have displaced none of their supposed hostility to the odor of white men and scores of marines use them to haul supplies. These oxen are well cared for by the men who work them.

Some animals, of course, were killed by artillery bombardments and some, particularly at night, have been shot by sentries who suspected they might be Japs. It is reported here that when some Japs drove goats ahead of them in a night attack, the marines took pains to shoot the Japs without hitting the goats. Various marine units have adopted Jap dogs, rabbits, goats and even chickens as mascots.

Of all these animals, the only ones to suffer any deliberate hurt from the marines are the chickens—the men, after awhile, get tired of canned rations.

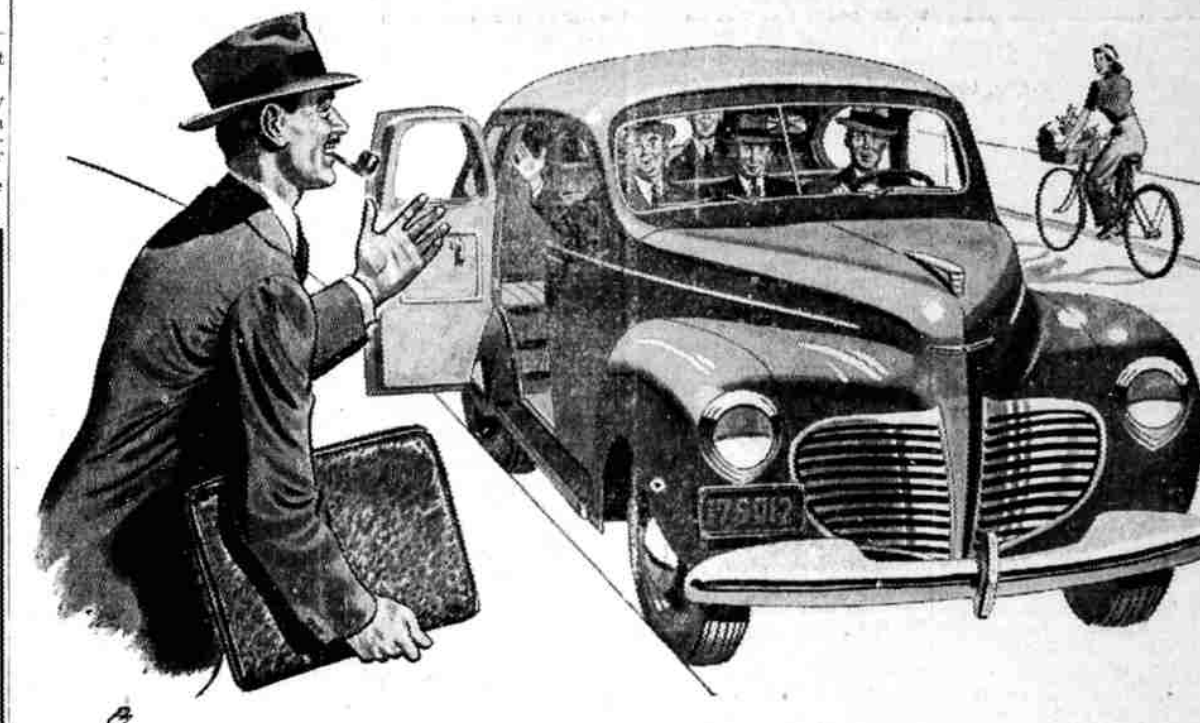
