MERCY AND THE SWORD

POPE PIUS XII has appealed to the people of London, according to news dispatches, to bear their trials with fortitude and with "Christian sentiments of forgiveness, charity and mercy, so that God may reward what the world will admire—an example of magnanimity inspired by the spirit of Christ's gospel"

The papal plea is a tough order for a nation which experienced the "blitz," which numbers Dunkerque among its dark hours, and which, even now, is experiencing the wanton destruction of life and property wrought by the "buzzbomb," the robot weapon which serves no purpose other than to terrify and kill helpless men, women and children, destroying homes, schools, churches and hospitals with a ruthlessness and savagery which makes mockery of the word "civilization."

"Forgiveness, charity and mercy" are Christian principles dear to the heart of the leader of a mighty church, which sheds its influence upon all the world and serves as spiritual guide to millions of people in all lands. They are attributes essential to any continued peace.

But a passive Christianity cannot deal with today's immediate problems. Christianity must be militant to wipe out the terrible scourge of evil which has risen to plague all peoples. The madmen who have despoiled the world must themselves be destroyed and their civil influence erased from the minds of men. To the mind which looks upon human kindness, mercy and forgiveness as signs of weakness, the application of those qualities is futile. Those who understand or appreciate nothing but force, might, and power can be subdued only by superior force, might and power. Men who, steeped in theories of master races, torture, kill and destroy in frenzy of gomania, are the very antithesis of the Christian. Militant Christianity, therefore, must destroy this evil.

"All they that take the sword shall perish by the sword." But once the scourge has been removed; the cancer of "right through might" amputated from the human mind, then there is healing in the words of the pontiff's appeal:

"Our lively hope and our confident conviction is that you will work toward realization of universal harmony in Christ, while in word and act, through prayer and personal sacrifice and the shining example of a sincere Christian life, you help those millions of noble souls who are your separated brethren to return to the fold and so make your contribution toward the establishment on earth of the reign of Christ, the Prince of Peace."

Straining At A Gnat

Herbert E. Brownell, Jr., Republican national chairman, is reported to have been stirred out of his usual calm and poise by a radio commentator, identified by network officials as Drey Pearson, who reportedly criticized John Foster Dulles, Dewey's foreign affairs adviser, for using one of Governor Dewey's automobiles and driving from New York to Washington, "wasting gasoline," to confer with Secretary Hull on matters pertaining to world peace.

It would seem that Commentator Pearson is one of those who "strain at a gnat, and swallow a camel." Dulles, suffering from a foot infection, confined to his home for three weeks and twice hospitalized, made the trip in defiance of orders from his physician forbidding him to attempt the journey. Following the conference he was ordered to the hospital where he underwent a two-hour operation.

But what about President Roosevelt's \$20,000,000 excursion into the Pacific to "learn facts," which were fully tabulated in the offices of the War Department in Washington? Or Eleanor's luxurious excursions in specially furnished planes accompanied by fighter escort, burning much more gasoline per minute than Dulles consumed in his entire trip?
