WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company today asked interstate commerce commission authority to issue \$72,194,000 of 3 per cent refunding mortgage bonds to finance the retirement of a like amount of 4 per cent first and refunding mortgage bonds.

Teachers' Meeting Dates are Changed

In order to accommodate schools on the coast which open September 5 Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, reports that it has been necessary to change the date of the two elementary teachers' conferences. The conference at Myrtle Creek will be held Wednesday and Thursday, September 6-7. The conference at Elkton will be Friday and Saturday, September 8-9. Both conferences will begin at 9 a. m. with the speakers being Miss Ida Mae Smith of the Oregon College of Education and Dr. Martha Addy of the state department of education.

The southern conference will have as hostesses the Myrtle Creek elementary teachers who are arranging for a potluck dinner at the school. At Elkton the school faculty

will provide a lunch to be served at cost.

In spite of reports to the contrary, Mrs. Gorrell states that the teacher situation in this county is critical. In some schools it has been impossible to complete the corps of teachers and in others resignations are leaving the schools without enough teachers. Some of these schools are scheduled to begin September 5, and are still without teachers for several of their rooms.

Annexation Vote Will Enlarge City of Albany

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 31.—(AP)—Albany will gain about 75 per cent in territory and 2500 population as a result of a special annexation election, town officials said today.

Four of five districts adjacent to the city voted yesterday to enter the city limits, and the town residents strongly favored the additions. District No. 4, west of Albany voted to remain outside.
