Poland Reviving After Five Years As Nazi Slaughterhouse; Jews Get Equality With All Other Citizens

LUBLIN, Poland, Aug. 30. (AP)—A Poland unbroken in spirit after five years as a Nazi slaughterhouse gropes courageously today for a new life of freedom and peace.

In Lublin, 35 miles behind the red army front and 700 miles from Moscow, a provisional government of Poles exercises wide authority without the appearance of foreign interference.

Catholicism continues as the state religion and priests teach in the public schools. Church property and lands are untouched. Peasant market thrives in an open square where the Germans had razed to the ground a section of Lublin's medieval ghetto, and the only control on prices there is the law of supply and demand.

Thousands of young Poles, most of them still in civilian clothes for uniforms are scarce, drill in the cobblestoned streets under grizzled veterans of guerilla warfare—recruits for a Polish army that is expected soon to be a half million men and women. Women carry arms and serve in all branches of the national defense except actual combat.

Jews Enjoy Equality
A few score Jews, all that are left of the prewar ghetto population of 40,000, never can efface the memory of the German terror but in this new Poland—whose national committee includes a prominent Zionist—there are no barriers of race or creed against them.

Anti-aircraft guns bark on the outskirts of Lublin and high flying German observation planes are a daily sight. The stench from the infamous Majdanek prison camp, where it is estimated 600,000 or more victims of Nazi sadism were put to death within view of Lublin's cathedral spire, becomes a nauseating reminder when the wind is from the east.

Poland still is in the agony of war. Lublin citizens know their kinfolk have been dying by thousands in the smoldering ruins of Warsaw. But here, where Poles sit in the highest government offices, Polish judges and police conduct the administration of justice and Polish newspapers forecast an era of prosperous democracy. Polish pride and hope are reborn.

Standing in Krakow street beside the bomb-wrecked clock tower, you meet Poles great and small who speak with unquenchable hatred of past German tortures and with determination of rebuilding a strong independent Poland.

Slaughter of Jews Told
Dr. Emil Sommerstein, gray-bearded like an ancient patriarch and the only Jewish member of the Committee of National Liberation, says:

"There were three and a half million Polish Jews before the war. Now, counting emigration to Russia, Palestine and other countries, perhaps 300,000 still live. Some 60,000 young Jews were compelled to work in German war industries at Lodz. What has happened to them we don't know."

Perennial Wheat Type Developed by Russians

The Moscow press recently reported that a perennial variety of wheat has been successful in practical field tests this year on collective farms from Siberia to the Kuban. No data are available on the yields per acre. The several varieties being tested persist as long as five years after sowing. The kernels have a gluten content as high as American wheat. The immediate goal of one experiment is wheat which will give a normal harvest for two years from one planting. The wheat was developed by cross pollination of wild perennial grasses of the Agropyrum family with wheat.

More Dehydrated Meal Promised for Feed

WFA has announced that it will recommend priorities for the installation of new alfalfa-meal dehydrators to producers of secured alfalfa meal who will convert at least part of their production without using additional grinding equipment. Release of materials has been authorized for the expansion and WFA desires to increase the production of dehydrated alfalfa meal for poultry and livestock feed. Dehydrated meal contains more carotene or vitamin A than sun-cured.
