

Soviet Blast Seen As Move To Gain Dardanelles Use

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Behind Soviet Pravda's blast at Turkey today is a Russian determination, widely recognized in official quarters here, to gain unlimited access to the Mediterranean sea through the Turkish-controlled Dardanelles.

This determination, it is reported, has been expressed eventually in more exact terms. Possibly Russia will insist that the Dardanelles be internationalized under the proposed new world security organization; possibly it will ask merely that Turkey sign away forever any rights to bar Russian ships from Dardanelles passage.

Officials here expressed great interest in the criticism of Turkey published in the semi-official newspaper Pravda. An article said that Turkey's recent diplomatic break with the nazis was being turned into a "friendly rupture" and that nazi spies still were operating in Turkey.

Some American officials were of the view that the article more accurately pictured conditions as they had existed in Turkey several weeks ago than today.

Most significance was attached here to the fact that the Pravda article, in the Russian tradition of journalistic attacks for diplomatic purposes, comes at a time when red armies are drawing near to European Turkey and the historic passageway between the Black sea and the Mediterranean.

Bulgaria is expected to make an armistice in a few days. In the circumstances, it was said here, Russia wants to put Turkey on notice that her break with Germany comes too late to entitle her to any special consideration in the war settlements.

Having thus made her position clear, Russia is expected to go ahead with demands regarding the Dardanelles and access to the Mediterranean which, until now, has been a primary sphere of British influence.

Tax Filing Method On CCC Loans Described

The county AAA office offers the following information to answer farmers' queries regarding the method which they should use in reporting CCC loans on income tax returns. The internal revenue code provides that the taxpayer may elect to include the amount of the loan in his gross income for the taxable year in which the loan is received. However, if the taxpayer makes such election, then for subsequent taxable years he must include in his gross income all amounts received during those years as CCC loans, unless he secures permission from the commissioner of internal revenue to change to a different method of accounting. Once a taxpayer makes his election to consider CCC loans as income, he must continue this method of accounting for income tax purposes unless permission to

change is filed with the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C., within ninety days after the beginning of the tax year to be covered by the return.

Gov. Warren Raps C. I. O. Effort To "Buy Election"

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Republicans believe it is their duty, with American boys dying in defense of the country, to preserve the government as we believe they would have it preserved," says Gov. Earl Warren of California.

"We believe the things that apply with equal force to each side," he added in a radio address last night. "And that new deal speeches should not be designated as 'educational' while others of like character by socialists and republicans are suppressed from our fighting men as political."

At another point he declared: "The republican party does not propose to buy this election. We insist, though, that Mr. Sidney Hillman and his committees shall not be permitted to do it either. We know that they do have in mind lavish and uncontrolled campaign expenditures in behalf of the new deal candidates, and that their real purposes have not been fully disclosed."

The CIO political action committee, of which Hillman is chairman, apparently was one of the committees referred to by the governor, who continued: "They claim to speak for, but they actually do not represent, the workers of America in this campaign. They are, as their name implies, a 'political action group'."

"It is our earnest belief that these and other forces which recently captured the machinery of the democratic party are not planning the future of our fighting men and of our people as they would have it planned."

FRESH PEACH JAM IS EASY TO MAKE

Here's a Recipe That Saves Sugar and Fruit

4 Cups Ground Peaches
6 Cups Sugar
2 1/2 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, peel and remove pits from 4 pounds fully ripe peaches; grind the fruit. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground peaches (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) in a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

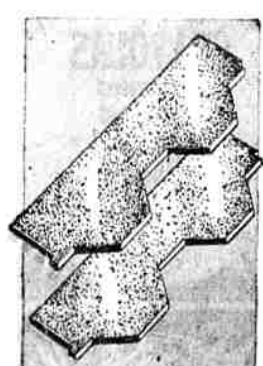

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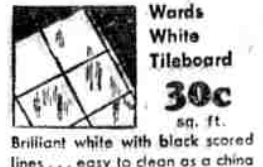
