

Dunham's Defeat Caribous to Near Half-Season Title

Dunham's Transfermen lacked only one more victory today to secure themselves championship for the first half of the Softball league season and a right to enter the playoffs between first and second half leaders, as a result of a 14 to 3 win over the Sutherland Caribous last night. The game was postponed from the first half, but Dunham's also must play off a postponed game with the Roseburg Lumbermen before

having clear claim to the title. Next Wednesday night, Sept. 6, Dunham's will meet Roseburg Lumber and at the same time Sutherland Caribous and Olympia Supply will meet to play off the second half tie between those two teams.

Injuries Are Handicaps
Both teams last night were in badly crippled condition, but Sutherland's handicaps were the more keenly felt. Vang, the Sutherland pitcher, was suffering from an injured leg and was unable to throw his customary speed ball. He was forced to retire in the fifth inning. Baughman, Sutherland catcher, also was playing with a leg injured in a game last week.

Sutherland scored two runs in the first inning and one in the seventh but could not get a runner around the bases in any other frame. Three hits were bunched in the fourth inning, but two runners were thrown out on bases. Ellison, pitching for Dunham's, yielded only five hits in the seven innings.

Dunham's pushed over five runs in the first inning on a combination of five hits, one walk and one error, and proceeded to score runs in all except the third inning.

Turkey Crop This Year to be Record

DENVER, Aug. 31.—A record number of turkeys will be raised in the nation this year.

The United States department of agriculture announced that there will be 35,600,000 turkeys, or 8 per cent more than last year, and 4 per cent above the previous record crop of 1940.

The turkey crops in the western states, where about 31 per cent of the nation's turkeys are raised, is the largest in 16 years of record.

Turkey marketings are expected to be earlier than usual this year, with indications that the October or earlier marketings will be the largest in nine years of record.

The government is again trying to get as many birds as possible for the armed forces and an embargo has been placed on sales of turkeys to other than the government in the surplus turkey producing areas.

Beavers Defeat Padres; Rainiers Win 13-Frame Tilt

Hollywood capitalized on two Seal errors in the first game of the winning run in the third inning for a 3 to 2 victory. The Stars scored their first two runs when Kelleher blasted out his 22nd homer of the season with one man on in the first.

Joyce limited the Stars to four hits but Kelleher's homer and the bobbles in the field cost him the game. The Seals took the nightcap, 3 to 1.

Death Fulfills Prophecy Of Under-Age Soldier

SEATTLE, Aug. 31.—(AP)—William Westlake, then 13, was in a prophetic mood beyond his years two years ago, when he was mandated for scribbling his name at the base of the victory square nylon which bears the name of Seattle's war dead.

"Someday my name might really be put up there," he said. Yesterday his mother, Mrs. Beatrice Atwell, received word that the 15-year-old boy, whose size enabled him to pass as older and en-

list in the marines when he was 14, was killed in the Pacific. His name will be among the 171 to be placed on the pylon at the next memorial service.

Federal Aid Road Bill Satisfies Gov. Snell

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 31.—(AP)—The federal aid highway bill now in the senate is "very acceptable to Oregon," Governor Snell telegraphed today to Senator Guy Cordon.

Under the bill, Oregon would spend \$16,500,000 a year for the first three postwar years, half of the amount to be contributed by the government, and the other half by the state.

The governor urged that the bill be considered soon so that state legislatures, most of which meet next January, may make their state highway plans.

Duchess of Windsor Undergoes Appendectomy

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The Duchess of Windsor underwent successfully an operation for appendicitis at Roosevelt hospital today, Dr. Joe R. Clemmons, medical director, announced.

"The operation was successfully carried out and no adverse complications are anticipated," Dr. Clemmons said.

Elaborate precautions were taken to protect the privacy of the 38-year-old, American-born duchess who married the former king of England. All hospital entrances were guarded by police, and reporters were barred from the information desk.

Rodley Infant Passes Away Soon After Birth

John Guy Rodley, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. John Rodley of Roseburg, died Wednesday night at Mercy hospital shortly after birth. The parents, a brother and a sister survive. Graveside prayer and burial will be conducted by Dr. C. A. Edwards at the Lookingglass cemetery at 10 a. m. Friday. Arrangements are in charge of the Roseburg Undertaking company.

Benefit Boosts Rejected
