Four New Books Offered at Public Library, Roseburg

Four new books received at the Roseburg Public library include an offering of the Book of the Month club, "Green Dolphin Street," by Elizabeth Goudge, an outstanding contemporary novelist well known to readers of high class fiction.

A Western is No. 4 in the new batch. The author is Peter Field, the title of the book "Midnight Round-up." Contains something very unusual in the way of plots for such a type of yarn.

Corn Ear Worm Bad in Late Crop; Mineral Oil Kills

Sweet corn that matures in Oregon from the first of September on is most likely to be infested with the corn ear worm, even though that which matures earlier may be largely free from this pest, points out Robert E. Rieder, extension entomologist and plant pathologist at Oregon State college in giving directions for using mineral oil to protect the ears. This second generation infestation is particularly true in western Oregon, he says.

Proper application of white mineral oil containing two-tenths per cent pyrethrins will give approximately 85 to 95 per cent worm-free ears, tests in Oregon have shown. This is the type of oil usually sold for this purpose. Straight white mineral oil will give from 60 to 75 per cent worm-free ears, says Rieder.

The oil is applied with an adjustable force oiler—or even a medicine dropper for small patches—just after the silks have wilted and turned brown at the tips. About 15 drops, or a half filled medicine dropper, is the dose per ear, forced into the tip of the ear about a quarter to a half inch.

"The important thing is exact timing," Rieder cautions. "If applied too early the oil will interfere with pollination, and if too late some worms may get in. Only one application is made to each ear. Marking each ear with chalk when treated permits covering a patch several times, as ears reach the proper stage, without duplication."

Fred C. Uebel, Resident Of Glendale, Passes

Fred C. Uebel, well known Glendale resident, died Wednesday at St. Vincent's hospital in Portland following a short illness. Mr. Uebel, who moved to Glendale with his family in 1942 from Grand Island, Neb., had been employed as head bookkeeper for the Ingham Lumber company.

Surviving are his wife; a daughter, Evelyn Uebel, and a son, Everett, now in the army air forces and stationed in Kansas.

The body was taken to Grand Island, Nebraska, for services and interment.

Boys in Forest Work to Return Soon to School

A large percentage of high school boys now employed with the forest service will be discontinuing their work and returning to school within the next 10 days, V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest service, reports. Many teachers

of Douglas county schools and other schools within the state, who have been working with the forest service this year, will also be leaving soon after the first of September, Mr. Harpham said.

Miss Ruth Morgan Enlists in Wacs

Miss Ruth Morgan, daughter of Dwight C. Morgan, of Roseburg, has completed her enlistment in the Women's Army Corps at Portland. She will be called to active duty early in September and will be sent to Fort Des Moines, Iowa, for basic training. Upon completion of her basic training she will be assigned to the communication section of the Portland army air base.

Prior to her enlistment in the army, Miss Morgan attended Lookingglass high school and was active in sports and the 4-H club. She was captain of the high school volleyball team for four years and played softball.

Miss Morgan also took an active part in the aircraft warning service during the entire period of its operation. She also was active in the Keep Oregon Green club.

Proposed Logging Roads Are Being Located

H. F. Erickson of the forest service engineering department at Portland, is spending two weeks at the Umpqua National forest service headquarters in Roseburg, to assist local personnel in location of some logging roads which it will be necessary to build at an early date. Walter Holbrook is working with him.

Mr. Erickson reports that the huckleberry crop is a fair one at Huckleberry lake on the Umpqua-Rogue divide near Butler butte and the berries are now at their best. Several parties are already picking. Mr. Erickson says, and people should register or secure a permit at either Tiller ranger station or Summit guard station to enter the area.

Public Carefulness in Forests Appreciated

V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest service, reports he greatly appreciates the cooperation campers and travelers have given to this date. There has been, Mr. Harpham reports, only one man-caused fire out of a total of 52. This was started by a small campfire. All other fires have been caused by lightning.

Several thousand visitors have been reported on the North Umpqua river this season and it is requested that all visitors be particularly careful now until heavy rains come, since records from the state and government indicate very definitely the worst fires ever experienced in the west have developed in late August and September, Mr. Harpham said.

Boy Scout Camp Attendance This Year Shows Gain

Nearly twice as many boy scouts attended Camp Lucky Boy, Oregon Trail council summer camp on Blue river, during the 1944 season than in 1943, according to a report today from K. A. Wells scout executive.

The report showed that 425 scouts in the council, which is made up of Lane, Benton, Lincoln, Douglas, Coos, and Curry counties, attended the camp this year while only 220 different scouts attended in 1943.

The largest increase of the season was in the number of "camper weeks" which totaled 575 this year against 260 for 1943. The scouts who attended Camp Lucky Boy came from all seven districts of the council and represented fifty-three troops.

This year's summer camp was described as "very successful" by Wells with especially good results from the scout training program carried on during the seven-week season. In addition to those scouts who worked on scout advancement, 72 received advancement in rank and there were 213 merit badges presented at the camp courts of honor.

Wells commended the older scouts who served on the camp staff during the season.
