NEWS OF OUR MEN-WOMEN IN UNIFORM

Word has been received from Art Davidson, aviation metallurgy second class, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Davidson, 604 E. Douglas street, Roseburg. He states he is well and somewhere in the Pacific. He was recently assigned to sea duty aboard a seaplane tender. His brother, Corporal Jim Davidson, recently received the wings of an armorer gunner at graduation at Buckingham army air field, Fort Meyer, Florida. He expects to be home one furlough soon.

John C. Edwards, son of Dr. and Mrs. Charles A. Edwards, Roseburg, has arrived in San Francisco on a 50-day cruise, according to word received by his parents.
