Mary Ellen Darby Wins War Badge, Meets Brother After Five Years



Recently awarded the second highest emblem which may be conferred upon a civilian, Mrs. William C. Fetter, formerly Mary Ellen Darby, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Darby of Roseburg, also had an opportunity for a reunion with her brother, Lieutenant James Darby, at an undisclosed air base in the Southwest Pacific. Pictured above, it was their first meeting in five years.

Announcement of the great honor conferred upon Mrs. Fetter, a graduate of Roseburg high school and former employee at the office of the California Oregon Power company, was made by headquarters of the 7th army airways communications system wing of the army air forces. She was awarded the War department emblem for meritorious civilian service, the second highest military honor which can be conferred upon a civilian.

Presentation of the badge was made to Mrs. Fetter at an informal ceremony at an allied air base in the Southwest Pacific during a conference of the 7th AACS wing and group commanders, which she attended in her capacity as wing chief of personnel. Mrs. Fetter has been associated with the AAF communications activities in the Pacific since July 1941. She was serving in that capacity during the attack on Pearl Harbor, being stationed in Honolulu at that time. Her work involves information of a highly secret nature and of great military importance.

En route to the Southwest Pacific by plane, she had the opportunity to visit briefly with her brother at an air base where he is now stationed.
