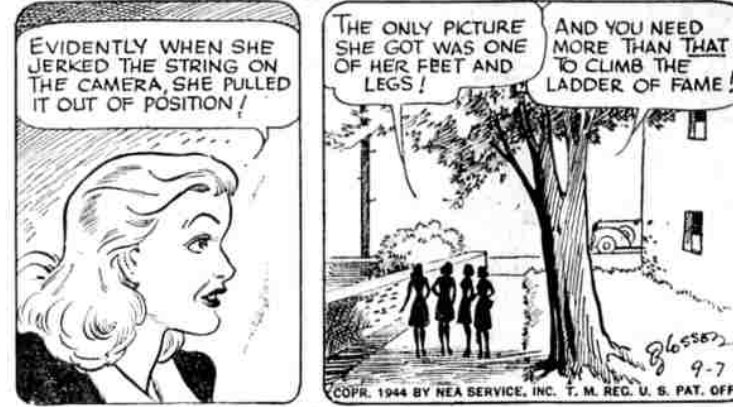

## Hunters, Farmers Allowed Certain Size Ammunition

In order to protect crops and livestock, and to increase the food supply, the War Production board has issued an order making it possible for farmers and ranchers to secure supplementary quantities of ammunition, and for hunters to secure ammunition for the hunting season. The following quantities of ammunition may be purchased from retail dealers: 150 rounds of .22 caliber rim fire cartridges. 40 rounds of center fire rifle ammunition (or 50 rounds of the kind ordinarily packaged fifty to the box.)

100 rounds of shotgun shells of any gauge.

The procedure to secure these quantities of ammunition is extremely simple. All the purchaser needs to do is to sign the standard certification under priorities regulation number 7, or place the following certificate on his purchase order:

"The undersigned purchaser certifies, subject to the penalties of section 35 (A) of the U. S. Criminal Code, to the seller and to the War Production board, that, to the best of his knowledge and belief, the undersigned is authorized under applicable War Production board regulations or orders to place this delivery order and to receive the item(s) ordered for the purpose of which ordered."

It was explained that due to the shortage of ammunition during the past several seasons, game, birds, and animals have increased very rapidly, and the War Production board feels that the release of ammunition at this time will serve to reduce this increase, and provide additional food supplies. Ammunition secured under this regulation cannot legally be used for target practice, skeet or trap shooting, and must be purchased before January 1, 1945.
