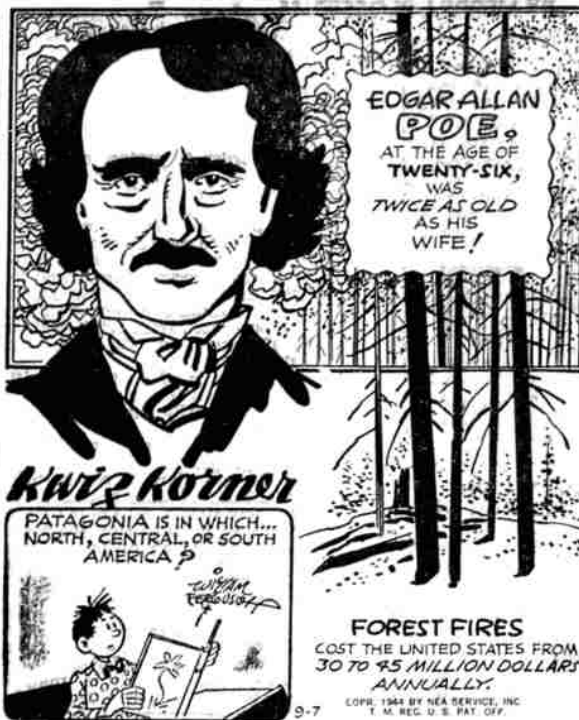
RIVERSDALE GRANGE HAS INTERESTING MEETING FRIDAY

Man's Discovery Of Hotel Fire Ends His Eventful Day

REEDSPORT — Saturday was an eventful day for Frank L. Weichlein and Dale E. Powell, Southern Pacific engineer and fireman running between Reedspore and Eugene on a local freight. Coming west Saturday afternoon, they suddenly came upon P. L. Beck riding a railroad speeder as they rounded a curve on the railroad about one-and-a-half miles west of Ada. Beck, who is a car inspector at Reedspore but lives at Ada, was on his way home from work and thought that he was able to make his station before the freight passed there.

On being confronted by the fast approaching engine of the freight, he quickly unloaded from the speeder and left it to its fate. Engineer Weichlein was unable to stop the train, and the speeder was left a complete wreck.

Their day of adventure was not over. They came on into Reedspore and registered at the Welcome hotel, and at 4 a. m. Sunday morning Powell awoke from a sound sleep to find his room filled with smoke. On investigation he found there was no fire in his room and after going down the hall to the hotel lobby he found one of the davenport smoldering and a throw blanket covering in flames.

Powell grabbed the burning blanket and threw it into the street and then aroused the hotel manager, who removed the smoldering cushions and took them outside to discover that they were already soaking with water. It was learned that whoever set

the fire, probably from a lighted cigarette, had removed some flowers from a large vase and doused the burning cushion with water and then made an exit.

Fortunately the only damage was to the davenport and the loss of the blanket, but the lives of the 27 occupants of the hotel rooms were endangered by the party who was responsible for the fire and who left the hotel knowing that a fire existed.

Army's Sacrifice In Tire Situation Told Sen. Cordon

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—(AP)—The army, Maj. Gen. Lucius D. Clay writes Senator Cordon of Oregon, has cut its tire supplies to a dangerously low level to aid in civilian needs.

Cordon had submitted to General Clay, director of material for the general staff, a plan offered by W. E. Peck, chairman of the Oregon emergency truck tire committee, for maintaining essential transportation.

Army tire requirements for the fourth quarter of 1944, Clay wrote, are based on lower authorized levels than formerly and, in the case of many critical sizes, are lower than operating echelons believed adequate.

Army depot tire stocks, he continues, are currently at dangerously low levels in most truck and bus sizes. Clay said the army has put tire manufacturing ahead on the list of "must" programs, is receiving the full cooperation of the war manpower commission in providing labor for the industry, has released skilled tire makers from service, along with some other potential workers and has organized a special unit of officers to aid the industry in staffing its plants. Inventories, he said, are under constant review and the surplus is released to civilian usage.

"The army," Clay declared, "is fully aware of the necessity for maintaining the nation's transportation system during this critical period."

Security Tax Rate's Retention Aim of Bill

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Legislation continuing during 1945 the same old age retirement social security tax rate on em-

ployers and employees—one per cent for each—has been prepared for introduction in the house by Rep. Le Compté (R.-Ia.).

Unless such a bill is passed by this session of congress the tax automatically will increase to two per cent for employers and two per cent for employees on January 1. The increase has been several times postponed by congressional action.

Le Compté contends the social security fund has a sufficient reserve.
