ROSEBURG CONCERT ASSN. MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN OPEN UNTIL SEPTEMBER 15

The second annual membership campaign of the Roseburg Community concert association is now open and will continue open for all former members until Sept. 15, according to an announcement made this morning by the president, Miss Gladys H. Strong. Members have been mailed letters by the secretary, Mrs. Frances Lintott, and have until Sept. 15 to renew their memberships.

At the close of the renewal period of all charter members, the waiting list will be given membership, before the formal opening of the 1944-45 campaign which will officially open at a dinner meeting of members of the board, officers of the association and workers to take place Sept. 25. Mrs. Gilbert Walters is in charge of the dinner arrangements and David Ferguson, representative of Columbia Concerts, Inc., will be present for the occasion and will remain in Roseburg during the week's campaign. At the close of the campaign, no memberships will be received for the remainder of the year and no individual tickets will be available for anyone at all of the concerts sponsored by the association throughout the season.

The 1943-44 season was the first to be enjoyed by the Roseburg community association. Communities throughout the entire county are represented in the association.

Three concerts are guaranteed for the season and last year, four exceptionally fine artists were presented in Roseburg including: Dorothy Mayor, soprano; Todd Duncan, baritone; Patricia Travers, violinist; and Walter Hantz, pianist. The association officers hope to have this year's concerts equally as fine and report that everything points to an exceptionally enjoyable season for the members. Headquarters for the campaign will be held at the Roseburg chamber of commerce office.

Teachers' Pay Hike Taken Into Court

CALDWELL, Idaho, Sept. 12 (AP)—Legality of Idaho's \$200 per year salary increase to school teachers will be determined at court hearings starting here September 20 before District Judge Charles E. Winstead of Boise.

Winstead was called after the seventh district's two judges, Thomas E. Buckner of Caldwell and A. O. Sutton of Weiser, disqualified themselves.

The suit filed by E. N. Hansen, Greenleaf farmer, seeks to have declared unconstitutional legislation passed last March appropriating \$100,000 in state funds and authorizing up to a mill and one-half increase in county tax levies to raise teacher wages.

Attorneys for the Nampa and Caldwell school districts, the Canyon county school superintendent, defendants in the suit, filed an answer to Hansen's complaint today.

Hot Weather Ripening Prunes; Pickers Needed

CORVALLIS Ore., Sept. 12 (AP)—Hot weather has ripened prunes about a week ahead of schedule and several hundred pickers are needed in the Dallas area, Charles Renner, Polk county farm labor assistant, reported. One thousand additional hop pickers are urgently needed around Independence, he added.

Tighter Farm Lumber Situation Indicated

The farm lumber situation is going to get tighter before it gets better, Leo Sparks, county AAA chairman, advises. Basis for this pessimistic view of the situation is information from the state AAA office that the farm lumber quota for the next quarter may be less than half of the quota for the current quarter. Mr. Sparks said that the local AAA office is making every effort to handle its priority assignment in connection

with the county farm lumber quota so that Douglas county farmers will have sufficient lumber for all essential needs. "The job that we're doing on this war assignment right now," Mr. Sparks observed, "is probably more satisfactory to local folks than it will be the next quarter when we have less available to satisfy farmers' needs."

Rodeo Effort Pleases Despite "Red" Balance

REEDSPORT—The Reedspott division of the Douglas county mounted police has about completed reports on its recent and first rodeo and is receiving congratulations on the excellence of the show produced, not only from local persons but from visitors from all over the state. Total attendance of the two-day show was in the neighborhood of 10,000. While it had expended a large amount of money in leasing and building the stands and grounds, the division finds that it is still a small amount in the red. However it is well pleased with its first effort along this line.
