Sgt. V. Morris of Alaskan Service Roseburg Visitor

Technical Sergeant Velmore Morris, former resident of Roseburg, visited briefly in the city Tuesday. A resident of Alaska for the past 11 years, he has been stationed in the Aleutian Islands since entering military service and has been serving in the crew of a crash boat, engaged in rescuing fliers of the 11th air force following forced landings at sea. Morris recently had a thrilling experience while engaged in ferrying a new boat from a California port to Seattle. The boat, held back by storms, ran out of fuel off Cape Nome. Because of damage to navigational instruments and travelling in dense fog, the position of the craft was misjudged and it was believed by the officers to be off Coos Bay. Sergeant Morris and a companion attempted to row ashore in an open dory but were carried out to sea by a current off the cape and were adrift 28 hours before being rescued by a civilian tug. The crash boats previous-

ly had been towed into port, and airplanes and blimps were sent out to search for Morris and his companion.

During his stay on the Aleutians he has gathered many interesting implements used by natives centuries ago, uncovered by construction operations and found as deep as 20 feet under the surface of the ground.
