Rev. Mr. Matthews will be accompanied by his mother, who will keep house and assist in the local church activities.

Rev. Robert E. Matthews was born in Sherman, Texas, Feb. 8, 1918, and attended grade school and high schools there. He also received his A. B. degree from Austin college in Sherman. He received his B. D. degree from the School of Theology at Southern Methodist university at Dallas, Texas. While in Dallas, he worked as assistant pastor of the Haskell avenue Methodist church and served as chaplain in the San Antonio, Texas, Y. M. C. A. camp. He has received training as a theological intern in the University of Michigan hospital, under the auspices of the National Council for Clinical Training; done two years graduate study at the Tiff school of Theology at Denver, Colorado, and has served one year as pastor of Lafayette and Louisville Methodist church in Colorado conference.

During this year Rev. Mr. Matthews taught instrumental music in the Louisville high school, worked with the Lions club, P. T. A. and the Masonic lodge. He is an ordained deacon.

Two Choices Open To Voters, Dewey Declares

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Sept. 14—(AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey, arriving in Sheridan for conferences with Wyoming republican leaders, told a crowd of 500 persons at the railway station that the voters this year have a choice "going down the new deal road to complete registration or up the republican road to a free society where we can achieve security and jobs for all."

Asserting that the new deal had failed to cope with unemployment in the prewar years, Dewey said: "One man managed to make a depression last for 11 years and that is an incredible record."

Fish Hatchery Fund to Be Asked of Legislature

PORTLAND, Sept. 14—Fish industry representatives asked today that Oregon appropriate \$20,000 from the state emergency

fund to insure continuance of fish hatcheries in the state.

A report studied by the fish commission at its regular meeting here urged that the legislature provide the commission with sufficient money to undertake a large propagation program. Logging operations and irrigation ditch construction have made heavy inroads in spawning areas, the industry claimed, causing a steady decline in the salmon run. The commission met to draft a budget for submission to the legislature.
