WE PREFER DEWEY

IN an editorial expressing the timidity and fear which has gripped so many of our people, including our political leadership, the *Oregon Journal*, Portland, which opposed a third term for President Roosevelt, announces it will support his bid for a fourth term. We don't imagine our opinion will worry *The Journal's* editor one whit, but we beg to disagree with his views.

Says *The Journal* editor:

Four years ago *The Journal* opposed a third term for President Roosevelt and supported Wendell Willkie. On November 7 the voters will choose between President Roosevelt for a fourth term and Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York. In four years the scene has changed. Prosecution of the war, until the unconditional surrender of Germany and Japan, now is the compelling issue.

Is it? True, the war has not been won. But does anyone believe seriously for one moment that a change of presidents would adversely affect the winning of the war? President Roosevelt, himself, has declared that the strategy of war has been mapped out. The heads of allied governments are now at work on subjects pertaining to the peace. Governor Dewey has firmly declared he would permit no interference with the military program, if elected. Too many people are swallowing the political hokum that the president, as commander-in-chief, is running the war.

The "compelling issue" in the forthcoming election, in our opinion, involves the making of the peace, the restoration of constitutional government in the United States, the reorganization of our domestic system, the elimination of bureaucracy, confusion and unessential spending and the establishment of a sound tax system.

Says *The Journal*:

There is much merit in charges against the New Deal, such as over-centralization of administration, entrenched bureaucracy and excessive expenditure. However, an increased Republican membership in the congress, which seems obvious, should have a salutary effect upon administration of domestic affairs in the event of Mr. Roosevelt's reelection.

Can we expect to establish a permanent peace, and a sound domestic economy with the president and congress at loggerheads? How is it possible to solve the questions of reconversion, unemployment, tax revisions and the myriad other problems that will mark the next few years when we have a president who believes in government by executive decree and who endeavors to solve every issue by creating new agencies and spending more money while congress is demanding its rightful place in government?

Again quoting *The Journal*:

The Journal has followed the career of Mr. Dewey with interest and with frequent appreciation. He is sincere and able and as a prosecutor his record is outstanding. As governor of New York he has cut costs and red tape and has achieved results through a harmonious and loyal organization. Yet much of his support as a candidate for president is negative in that it springs from a distrust of Mr. Roosevelt's administration of domestic affairs rather than from an enthusiasm for Mr. Dewey.

We plead guilty! Our position primarily has been anti-New Deal and secondly pro-Dewey. We sincerely believe that the essentials of good government are far more important than the personality of one man. We believe we would like Mr. Roosevelt. We believe he would be a wonderful fellow on a fishing trip, at a party or in any form of social contact. But we do not believe in his theory of government by machine politics, by division, by executive decree, by centralization of power or by perpetuity in office.

We believe Governor Dewey would be a fine president. *The Journal* admits his outstanding record as governor of New York. It would be well to remember Mr. Roosevelt's record in the same office, where he ran up a staggering deficit.

The chief problems of winning the war are behind us. Ahead lie the problems of making a lasting peace and restoring our domestic affairs. We do not want the confusion, which has marked the New Deal's administration at home, spread abroad. We do not want the world placed upon the United States' WPA payroll.

There is another angle which in our opinion makes Governor Dewey the more acceptable candidate.

The chance that President Roosevelt would outlive a fourth term is quoted by statisticians as 3 to 1 against him, even if he were in the best of health. Due to the strain he has been under, the odds are even greater that he will not be able to serve another four years. We sincerely hope, if he is reelected, he will remain in vigorous health for the following four years, for as vice-president we would have a man who, as a failure in private business life, came into politics through favors from one of the nation's most corrupt machines and who was given his current nomination through influence of the Kelly-Hague-Flynn-Hannegan combination.

News of 4-H CLUBS

The first 4-H club for the 1944-45 club year was organized this past week. It is to be a health club for students attending school at the Callahan Trail elementary school. Mrs. Katherine Cory, teacher, will be leader of the club. Club members are Eugene Hall, president; Glenn Wood, vice-president; Betty Butler, secretary; Colleen Pemberton, Donald Wood, Richard Wood, Wayne Wood, Tracy and Stanley Hall. A livestock club and gardening club are to be organized for the Callahan group later in the year.

The Roseburg Lions club will make awards in this year's 4-H book production contest at a special meeting of the club in the court room of the Douglas county building Thursday evening, September 28, reports Jerry Gibbo, chairman of the boys' and girls' club work committee of the Lions club. All awards will

be in the form of war bonds and stamps.

Five hundred dollars will be awarded to 4-H club boys and girls with projects in beef, dairy, sheep, swine, poultry, rabbits, canning and gardening. All projects have been scored by Kenneth Minniek, county club agent, assisted by members of the Lions club.

Minister to Lebanon, Syrian Republics Named

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19 (AP)—President Roosevelt today nominated George Wadsworth of New York, a career diplomat in the state department, to be this nation's first minister to the Lebanese and Syrian republics.

Wadsworth has been diplomatic agent at Beirut and Damascus and has held state department posts in Constantinople, Sofia and Cairo.

Because Syria and the Lebanese republics formerly were mandated territories, the state department in the past did not have a representative of ministerial rank there.

Mrs. Smith was a member of the Baptist church. Services will be conducted by Rev. F. G. Elliott, at the Community church at 2:30 p. m. Friday, with interment following in Fair Oaks cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of Stearns mortuary, Oakland.

Beavers, Angels Battle Tonight in Playoff Debut

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 20 (AP)—Winners of the Pacific Coast league championship for the second straight year, the Los Angeles Angels engage Portland tonight in the first game of a seven game series in the Shaughnessy playoff for a prize of \$10,000.

The game starts at 8 o'clock in Wrigley field. First will take the mound for the Angels against Portland's submarine tosser, Lisaka. Prim won 22 games during the regular season against Lisaka's 18. The Angels never have won a Shaughnessy playoff. They are red-hot favorites to take this one, however.

If they defeat Portland they will engage the winner of the San Francisco-Oakland series starting tonight in the Bay area. Portland finished second in the race and San Francisco and Oakland tied for third to complete the first division.
