

Further Govt. Aid In School Lunch Program Assured

Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, announced today that arrangements were being made for the continuation of federal assistance to local schools in the operation of a 1944-45 school lunch program.

"For several years schools in Roseburg and surrounding cities, as well as many rural communities, have served tasty and nutritious noon meals at low cost to the pupils attending, and we are pleased to know that financial aid will be available again for the coming year," Mrs. Gorrell said.

Under a cooperative agreement with the government, each school sponsor will be responsible for the labor and facilities needed to prepare noon meals and will contribute part of the cost of all goods purchased. The office of distribution of the War Food Administration will in turn reimburse the school for part of the food costs, and in addition may allot, temporarily, surplus foods purchased by WFA in fulfilling its price support commitments to farmers.

Two-Way Benefit.

The community school lunch program, a cooperative endeavor between War Food Administration, communities, and schools throughout the country, has been authorized annually by congress for ten years, and last year brought nutritious meals to more than 38,000 children in 389 Oregon schools. This program has a dual objective: (1) to help communities to develop and maintain programs of low-cost, yet adequate meals in schools, and (2) to encourage greater consumption of foods in temporary abundance, while aiding farmers to develop better local and domestic markets for their produce.

Any public or private school of high school level, or under, which operates on a non-profit basis, may apply for WFA assistance. The government's contribution varies with the financial need of each institution and the type of meal served. Any interested school can obtain full particu-

In depression years, these lunches proved very worthwhile to children in families with incomes insufficient to furnish adequate nutrition. Also, they have proved their value in overcoming mid-session fatigue, and have compensated for inadequate lunches carried from home. At present, with so many mothers working, preparation for lunches is sometimes neglected or left to the children; many children are forced to leave home at an early hour and have a long period between breakfast and lunch. These conditions make it more necessary to provide some means of adequate noon lunches, Mrs. Gorrell states.
