The Roseburg Community Concert association second annual membership campaign will officially open at a six-thirty o'clock dinner Monday evening at the Hotel Umpqua and will continue through Saturday, Sept. 30, according to an announcement by the president, Miss Gladys H. Strong, and the membership chairman, Miss Helen Casev, who is assisted by Mrs. C. A. Brand, Mrs. Gilbert Walters in charge of the dinner arrangements.

The association was formed last year with a membership of over 800. World-famous artists are brought here in concert during the year. The association guarantees three concerts a year and last season four concerts were presented.
