

Rookie Twirler Keeps Browns in Tie With Tigers

(By the Associated Press.)
Sig Jakucki could be the key to the American league pennant race today for the ex-soldier boy who was a June star, but an August washout for the Browns, had earned a most important victory that sent St. Louis back into a first place tie with Detroit.

With five games to go for the co-leaders and the New York Yankees halted three games back, Luke Sewell had his pitching staff straightened out with five trusted starters. Detroit again had to fall back solely on Newhouse, who goes today, and Trout, who probably will go tomorrow, and so on. Overmire's sore arm had complicated Steve O'Neill's problems.

Jakucki's feat, sensational enough on its own merits for it was a brilliant five-hit shutout over Boston 1-0, gained added stature for the rookie had not started in 16 days and hadn't won since Aug. 21.

After the Browns finish with Boston today the schedule calls for four "toughies" with the Yanks while Detroit entertains last-place Washington.

Detroit has Washington coming in when the Tigers finally get rid of Connie Mack's troublesome A's after two more tilts. Each team had six games to play.
