White candles, held in place with large white satin bows, marked the aisle for the bride party to pass through and advance to the altar, which was centered with a large bouquet of gladioli, greenery and palms, flanked by candelabra and cathedral candles with matching side bouquets.

Clayton Corde, tenor, sang, "Oh, Perfect Love" and "Because," accompanied by Mrs. Amy Welch, organist, who played the traditional wedding marches from Lohengrin and Mendelssohn.

The bride, who was given in marriage by her brother, L. E. Garwood, Jr., A. M. 2° U. S. Navy, who had just returned on leave from two years in the South Pacific and also was a former Roseburg resident, was very beautiful in a floor-length gown of ivory satin fashioned with a train, pointed sleeves, form-fitting bodice; sweetheart neckline edged with a band of beading matching the headpiece, which held her finger-tip veil of fine net edged with lace, in place.
