

Browns Win Their 1st American League Flag

Final Day Of Season Sees Race Decided

Detroit Nosed Out by 1 Game, Losing Finale to Last Place Washington

(By the Associated Press) America's third wartime baseball season ended yesterday with the St. Louis Browns winning their first pennant in the tightest race in American League history, a race not decided until the last out on the last day.

A 5-2 victory over the New York Yankees coupled with a Detroit defeat by Washington, 4-1, gave the flag to the Browns by one game, breaking a tie that had existed since Friday.

With all due credit to the Tigers for their amazing climb from seventh place on July 13, most fans were pulling for the Browns, not only because the Sewellmen had never won a pennant but also because of their thrilling comeback after they had apparently dropped out of the running. Just three weeks ago, they had skidded to third place after having led virtually all season.

With Sigmund Jakuksi hurling a six-hitter, the Browns swept a four-game series from the Yankees, to climax a great stretch driving, during which they won 11 out of 12.

Leonard Stops Tigers Emil (Dutch) Leonard, 34-year-old knuckleballer, who had not beaten the Tigers since Sept. 15, 1941, losing seven straight to the Bengals since, was the Tiger tamer, hurling a four-hitter before a dazed Detroit crowd of 45,565 fans. Stan Spence, whose hitting beat Detroit on Friday to create a first-place tie, cracked his third homer in three days to put the crusher on Detroit.

Dizzy Trout, who teamed with Hal Newhouser to set a new live-ball era record with 56 victories, made his second attempt in three days for his 28th victory, but suffered his 14th defeat instead.

Thus the Browns, who had finished as high as second only twice before—in 1902, when they first season, and in 1922, when they missed the pennant by one game—won the right to meet St. Louis' National League representative, the Cardinals, in the world series opening Wednesday.

The Yankees failed in an attempt to win their fourth straight flag, dropping to third, the lowest in the Joe McCarthy regime. War Draft Cripples Yankees

Hit hard by the loss of such stars as Bill Dickey, Charlie Keller, Joe Gordon, Bill Johnson and Spud Chandler, the Yankees put up a game fight, but faltered in the last week, ending with four straight losses to the Browns.

The Boston Red Sox, a contender fell back when their ace pitcher, Tex Hughson, winner of 18 games, and their ace hitter, Bob by Doerr, batting .325, were called into the service, a month before the close of the season. They finished with a .500 average in fourth place, 11 games off the pace.

The second division clubs were Cleveland and Philadelphia tied for fourth, Chicago seventh and Washington eighth. The Nats never were in the running, but blasted Detroit's hopes by winning two of the last four games from the Tigers, although Detroit won 17 out of 22 from them.

The Cards made a runaway race of winning their eighth flag and third in succession by a 14 game margin. They became the first club in National League history to win over 100 games for three successive years.

Drier Weather In September Noted

Weather for the month of September was considerably warmer and drier than normal, although no records were upset, according to the meteorological summary compiled by J. C. McCallister at the Roseburg office of the U. S. weather bureau.

Rainfall totaled .45 of an inch as compared with a normal of 1.27 inches. As the wet season is measured from Sept. 1 of each year, the deficiency is now listed at .52 of an inch, but for the calendar year, measured from Jan. 1, 1944, the deficiency now amounts to 3.07 inches.

Temperature for the month had a daily average of 3.3 degrees above normal, the highest being 104 degrees, on the 5th, the warmest September day on record, and the lowest 41 degrees on the 19th.
