How Allies May Police Germany



One reported product of the recent Quebec conference between President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill was virtual agreement on postwar occupation and control of Germany. As shown on the map above the reported plan is to divide Germany into three parts, each allocated to one of the United Nations' Big Three. The United States would run things in Baden, Wurttemberg, Bavaria and other territories in the south. Everything east of the Lubeck-Elbe River line would be under Soviet supervision, while Great Britain would take the northern provinces west of the Lubeck-Elbe line to the Netherlands border. Each area would be under a commissioner responsible to his own government, the three forming a German commission to co-ordinate general occupation policy. Under the Allies' Moscow declaration last December, Austria was promised independence, and it is likely that the U. S., Britain and the USSR will have representatives on an administrative Austrian Commission.

Brewers' Purchases of 1944 Hops Restricted

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 30 — (AP) — Restrictions on brewers' purchases of 1944 hops and hop products were announced here today by the regional War Food administration.

The order limits brewers to 150 per cent of the hops used in manufacturing malt beverages last year, minus the quantity they had on hand September 1, 1944.

The WFA said the limitation would assure fair distribution of the 46,765,000 pounds of hops

which the Pacific coast, major producing area, is expected to harvest this season. About 8,000,000 pounds probably will be exported.
