Senators Advise Against Sale of Federal Owned Plants in 11 States, Fearing Ruin to Industry Elsewhere

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—(AP)—A senate committee investigating industrial centralization proposed today a ban on reconversion of all government-owned war plants in 11 northern and eastern states.

It recommended large-scale industrialization of the west and south.

The report said these were the states in which government-owned war plants, representing an investment of seven billion dollars of public funds, should be frozen.

New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Maryland, Delaware, Rhode Island, Ohio, Michigan and Illinois.

The committee took the position that postwar prosperity and successful reconversion are linked inseparably to industrial decentralization.

The 11 states it singled out for a freeze of government war plants, the committee said, produced 45 per cent of the nation's manufacturing in 1939.

In a closed introduction to the report, Senator McCarran asserted that with the additional facilities acquired during the war, those 11 states can destroy the industries in the rest of the country and reduce the west and the south to misery.

These states, he declared, are the cream of the new war plants and the ones most easily reconvertable.

In contrast, McCarran said, the western and southern states furnished "disproportionately large number" of war plants that cannot readily be turned into peacetime production.

Attention he recommended special care to bring long-range and large-scale encouragement to new industries in the west and south.

Furthermore, it proposes that all restrictions on civilian production be cancelled as soon as possible.

Production Slowly Advised

As soon as the European war ends, the committee said, all possible war production, particularly of aircraft and ships, should be shifted to the west and south.

Committee attaches said the report contemplated that government-owned facilities in the north and east would not be sold to private operators, or operated by the government, until other sections of the country had had an opportunity to obtain stabilization for their own industrial employment problems.

They said the recommendations were of a "blanket" nature, pointing the way to a general course, but that each plant would have to be considered on an individual basis, since they might be some which should be reconvertable in the interest of the nation as a whole.

The Puget Sound navy yard at Bremerton, Wash., which has a major part in the maintenance of the Pacific fleet, wants men and women to repair and build navy ships, reports John M. McRobbie, personnel recruiter, from the navy yard. He is making a tour of western Oregon cities to interview personally everyone interested in obtaining work at the navy yard. He says, "Journeymen and helpers are especially needed in the following trades: Shipfitters, pipelitters, machinists, drillers, sheet metal men, chippers and caulkers, and electricians. However, men from 18 and women 20 to 45, regardless of previous experience, will be considered for employment. "Excellent housing facilities, completely furnished, are now available to couples, families of any size, and also single men." Any inquiries about the cost of food, recreation, etc. will be answered by McRobbie.

Transportation expenses, either by personal car or by bus, will be paid by the navy from Roseburg to Bremerton.
