Warren Says New Deal is in Pieces

CHICAGO, Oct. 3 (AP)—Governor Earl Warren of California said the new deal has "gone to pieces like the wonderful one-horse shay."

"There is no dominating principle that holds the new deal together at this time," he told the John Erickson Republican club. "We have an incongruous group of people who do not believe alike and are held together by patronage, which is not for the best interests of this nation."

Gov. Warren said that although current polls indicate that President Roosevelt is in the lead in California, "there is nothing the matter with our campaign in California that cannot be cured by hard work."

"The republican party is a rejuvenated party," he asserted. "Governor Dewey was splendidly received in California. He put new life in our campaign. We believe we're going to do all right on Nov. 7."

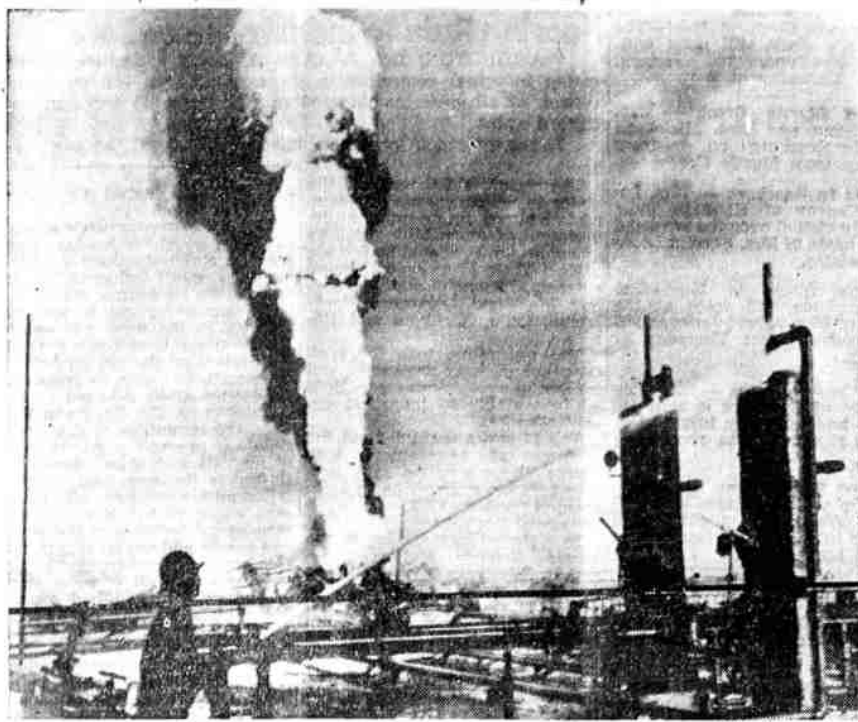

The game was marked by a red-hot southpaw pitching battle between the Angels' Prim and the Seals' Werle, both of whom went the distance. Werle gave up nine hits, Prim 10. Each fanned nine.
