17-Agers Offered Career Chances in American Navy

Young men of the 17 age who are interested in the career possibilities of the U. S. navy are being particularly sought at present for enlistment in the regular navy, according to Chief W. E. Bell of the Roseburg navy recruiting station.

The regular navy, he pointed out, offers distinct advantages to youths contemplating remaining in service after the war, including such benefits as retirement on liberal pension after 20 years' service, pay increases at the rate of 5 per cent every three years and opportunities to earn advancement.

Requirements for enlistment in the regular navy are somewhat higher than for the naval reserve, service in which is for the duration of the war only. Quotas for both branches of the naval service, however, now are wide open, and both these branches continue to offer young men the same opportunities for trade and vocational training, which can be utilized either in service or civilian life.

Another "No. 1" need of the navy continues to be the procurement of young men of 17 who can qualify for training under the radio technician program, a highly specialized type of education which should provide great opportunities for navy-trained radio engineers in post war days. Young men who can pass the qualifying test for "RT" training will be enlisted with the advance.

Residence Change Right at Issue in State High Court

SALEM, Oct. 4. (AP)—The question of whether a man may change his legal residence after he enters the armed forces will be decided by the state supreme court in an appeal from Multnomah county, the court announced today.

The case involves Richard H. Zimmerman, navy petty officer stationed at Swan island, who filed suit for divorce in Multnomah county. He was married three years ago at Washington Courthouse, Ohio.

Circuit Judge Tooez, Portland, dismissed the case on grounds

that Zimmerman still was a legal resident of Ohio, and that he should bring the suit in that state.

Zimmerman brought a mandamus proceeding in supreme court to compel Tooez to accept jurisdiction.

The court decided today, however, it would be better for it to hear an appeal from Tooez's dismissal, rather than to hear the mandamus proceeding. The court pointed out that to hear the mandamus case, it could consider only the question of jurisdiction, while to hear an appeal from Tooez's order would allow the high court to hear all questions in the case.

The State Bar association is interested in the case, court attaches said, because of the precedent it will establish.

Driver's Wages Fixed
PORTLAND, Oct. 5. (AP)—Oregon motor stages highway drivers were granted hourly wages of \$1.95 for the first six months, \$1.10 for the next six, and \$1.12 thereafter in an amended War Labor board order.

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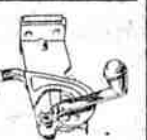
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
