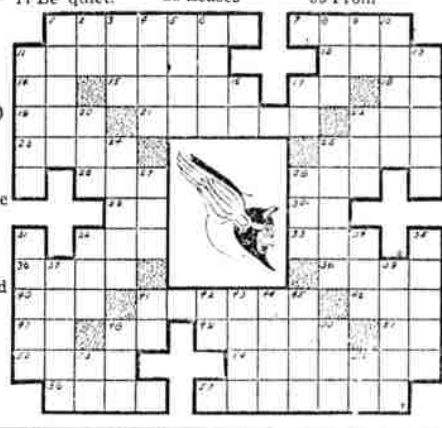

Observance of 3 Special Days is Asked by Gov. Snell

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Governor Snell today called for observance of tomorrow as newspaper boy day.

His statement said: "In these days when the military service of our youth is receiving greatest emphasis, let us not forget those of younger years who also are making a valuable wartime contribution. They are aiding the spread of information, aiding the public to unity and usefulness, as they themselves learn early in life that the way to success is through the use of their hands and minds in businesslike and courteous service to the public."

Next Monday will be Leif Erikson day in Oregon, Snell said today. The date honors the Norwegian Viking who sailed from Greenland in the year 1000 to become the first white man to set foot on North America.

Snell asked Oregon citizens yesterday to make plans for observance October 10 as the anniversary of the founding of the Chinese republic.

The governor said: "As we enter an intensive phase of the war with Japan this becomes an eventful year in our relations with China. Our participation in their natal day celebration, corresponding to our Fourth of July, will be particularly appropriate."

LA GRANDE, Ore., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Luther Hindman, prominent rancher, was crushed to death under his tractor while seeding a plot on his farm near Elgin, it was learned here today.

Hindman was a director of the Elgin First National bank. The widow, a son and two daughters survive.

Oregon Asks Right To Intervene In Income Tax Suit

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—As a friend of the court, the state of Oregon has asked the supreme court for authority to intervene in a case in which the supreme court has agreed to decide whether under Oklahoma community property law a man and his wife may divide equally their total income in calculating federal income taxes.

The internal revenue commissioner ruled that Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Harmon of Oklahoma were not entitled to divide their total income for federal tax purposes. The tax court of the United States, however, overruled the commissioner. The Tenth federal circuit court upheld the tax court and Solicitor General Charles Fahy was granted a review of the litigation by the supreme court. Argument will be heard early in the court's present term. Attorney General Neuner of Oregon, in asking permission for Oregon to intervene, said that a like problem existed in his state because it adopted in 1943 a community property law similar to Oklahoma's.

Reported Army Gasoline Waste Will Be Probed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—H. Ralph Burton, counsel for the house military committee, said today he had been directed by Chairman May to investigate complaints of gasoline waste by the army in Idaho.

Burton said complaints had been made by many individuals and by Rep. White (D-Idaho) that tank car loads of gasoline had been dumped and destroyed at Gowen field near Boise because it was below army standards. It was contended, Burton said, that the gasoline, although

perhaps not suitable for army use, could have been used for civilian automobiles.

Seed Potatoes Ceiling Prices for '44 Unchanged

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Ceiling prices for the 1944 crop of Oregon and Washington seed potatoes will be the same as last year, the Portland district OPA food price division said today.

Under the regulations, OPA explained, a shipper is permitted to charge the actual cost of transportation when a common contract or other carrier for hire is used.
