Northern California Sawmill Prey of Fire

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 7.—(AP)—The Shaw Lumber company's sawmill at Tionesta, Calif., 60 miles south of here, burned down last night at an estimated loss of \$150,000.

Offices of the company here reported that defective wiring or an overheated motor may have caused the blaze. The planing shop, warehouse and lumber in the yards were saved.

The loss was covered by insurance. No statement was immediately available from J. R. Shaw, president of the company, as to plans for rebuilding. The firm will continue logging operations in the Tionesta area and logs will be shipped by rail to mills here.

Food Shortage Forces Japs to Reduce Trains

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A "wholesale reorganization" of Japan's crowded railroads will become effective Wednesday, the Tokyo radio reported today.

"Ordinary passenger trains" and those trains of no immediate importance" will be "reduced to the minimum," the report said. The purpose is to provide more coaches for war workers and more freight cars for the "war goods transport services."

(Shortage of rail facilities is a major bottleneck causing Japan's domestic food shortages.)

China's Living Costs Soar Beyond Control

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A former American representative in China says that China's living costs have increased 100,000 per cent since 1937, and cannot be controlled by government regulation.

F. O. McMillan, Oregon State college professor who was sent by the state department to aid China with engineering problems, said the China economy is based on such small production units that nation-wide regulations are impossible.

Former Teacher In China to Talk In Roseburg Church

Rev. Stanton Lautenschlager, Chengtu, China, will arrive in Roseburg Thursday to be guest speaker at the Women's Society meeting of the First Presbyterian church at 1:30 o'clock and to be speaker at the congregational meeting and 6:45 o'clock potluck supper that evening at the church.

Rev. Mr. Lautenschlager was professor of modern history and sociology at Chechow university, Tsinan, China, and moved to the interior city of Chengtu with the university after enemy invasion of the country. He lectured and during four years of the war was instrumental in bringing 6,000 students to Christianity to its study. He wrote articles on the war in China, China's Northwest and student evangelism.
