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ONE INDISPENSABLE MAN

WE hear much political discussion today concerning the indispensable man. We hold to the theory that no man is indispensable in political office and that perpetuation in office is exceedingly dangerous to our American form of government.

Without responsible, serious-minded voters we can never expect to maintain a democracy, nor can we long expect continuation of a form of government based upon constitutional provisions. The American voter is the indispensable man because he holds in his hand the decision regarding the pattern of administration.

There never was a time in our history when the American voter needed more than now the realization of his responsibility. There is a crying need for clear-thinking. There is need for a rise beyond the level of mere partisanship.

It is regrettable that political leaders are failing to keep faith with the voter. These are not times in which to toss off vital issues with a smirk, a witticism or caustic criticism. These are not times in which to hedge or straddle.

But what do we have? We have political candidates and their henchmen skirting debatable issues, villifying one another, spreading false propaganda, straddling fences, avoiding showdown commitments, making wisecracks concerning matters of vital concern, smearing, ridiculing.

It becomes the duty of the American voter to weed out the falsities and to base his decision upon actualities. When efforts have been made for years to create divisions, build up class hatreds, establish special privilege groups and arouse suspicion and jealousies, it will be a difficult if not impossible, task to set aside all prejudice, selfishness and misunderstanding.

Many will be fooled by political camouflage. Others will be misled by false allegations and propaganda. Still others will be motivated by selfish interests.

Yet we have faith that the great mass of American voters will be sincere and conscientious in their decision. Because he is faced with confusion in the political campaign, the voter must assume the responsibility of sincerely applying himself to a conscientious study of conditions and trends and base his vote upon his findings.

The voter must place himself in the position of a jurymen in a courtroom, where attorneys are trying, by trick and argument, to gain his verdict. He must, as a jurymen is compelled to do, determine by testimony, evidence and rules, the truth of the issue and act with impartiality and without prejudice.

The voter must decide the form our government is to take. In his hands rests the fate of democracy, for if democracy fails in the United States, the pattern for liberty-loving peoples of the world, no other democratic nation will be able to survive the impact.
