Deadline Extended for Blue Tokens' Exchange

Grocers have another week, to October 16, to get the blue tokens in, G. M. Hufnagel, OPA rationing officer, advised today. He said the final date for retailers to deposit or exchange blue tokens was extended from October 9 to October 16 because of the large number of tokens spent by consumers as the September 30 deadline approached when blue tokens went out of use entirely.

Members of the food trade may deposit blue ration tokens in ration bank accounts or exchange them for other forms of ration currency at the local OPA boards.
