Mahoney Renews Debate Challenge To Sen. Cordon

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Willis Mahoney of Portland, democratic candidate for the U. S. senate, today renewed his challenge to his opponent, Guy Cordon of Roseburg, for a joint debate on the subject of their respective support of Roosevelt and Dewey.

Stating he had one refusal from Senator Cordon's secretary on the grounds that a proposed debate in Portland did not fit in with Senator Cordon's speaking schedule, Mahoney announced it would "gladly change" his own speaking schedule, "so that we can arrange a debate to be held at any city in Oregon to which Senator Cordon's speaking schedule takes him, and in which we can arrange a state-wide radio hook-up, to broadcast our discussion to the people of the state."

Mahoney said his challenge is based on Cordon's recent speech in Eugene, where he said Dewey has given the only outline of a constructive peace program, and that he supports Dewey 100 per cent.

"If the senator is sincere in his support of Dewey, I believe he should be willing to defend his position," Mahoney said.

"Sleeper" Fires Sought In Wake of Heavy Storm

Forest protection agencies were anxiously seeking traces of "sleeper" fires today following a severe electrical storm last night. Numerous lightning strikes were reported from the North Umpqua district but no fires had been reported at noon today. The storm was accompanied by a fair-weather rain believed to have been general throughout the greater part of the forest, agency officials report.

Pullorum Testing Ready To Aid Poultry Industry

Seventy-seven men and women qualified as pullorum testing agents to do official testing of chickens in Oregon, at the recent school held at Oregon State college. All turkey testing is done at the poultry disease laboratory.

Oregon poultry producers recently took a step in advance of the national movement when the Oregon Poultry and Turkey Improvement association adopted the national plan officially for Oregon but eliminated what is known as the pullorum test, a procedure that provides for higher tolerance than now permitted under the Oregon program.

All official pullorum testing and flock selection in chickens and turkeys will be carried on through these two Oregon improvement associations under programs approved by the state department of agriculture. Oregon exports approximately 100,000 pounds of chicken hatching eggs, about five million poults, and a large volume of breeding stock and baby chicks each year. These official programs are essential to maintain this export business, says Noel Bonnon, extension poultry specialist at Oregon State college.
