Britain to Bill U. S. for Aid After War, Prediction

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12—(AP)—

Back from a tour of England, Rep. Miller (R-Neb.) predicted that the United States "not only won't collect anything for lend-lease aid given to Great Britain" but probably will be billed for aid given it.

"This is sour and I hate to mention it," Miller said in an interview, "but I saw an official English statement that the British are keeping a record of all man-hours of labor used to move American troops and equipment and that is going to be checked against us when the war is over."

The record, he added, includes service and labor used "for moving the troops across the channel to the continent." Also, he said, it covers "everything from shoe polish to liquor."

Two other traveling congressmen, Reps. Mundt (R-S. D.) and Richards (D-S. C.), said in a London interview a month ago that there should be an auditing of lend-lease and reverse lend-lease—British aid to America—immediately after victory in Europe.

A report given congress by President Roosevelt in August estimated reverse lend-lease from the United Kingdom at more than \$1,900,000,000 up to April 1 and lend-lease efforts to Britain through June 30 at \$9,300,000,000.

Negress Kidnapers Tans White Child Victim

DETROIT, Oct. 11—(AP)—Robert James King, four-month-old white child abducted 10 days ago by his newly employed negro nursemaid, has been returned safely to his parents, Paul H. Wencel, chief of detectives, announced today.

A woman, identified as the nursemaid, in whose home the child was found is being held. Wencel said she gave her name as Mrs. Eleanor Smith, 33, and that she had sought to delude her husband into believing the

child was theirs by altering its complexion with sun tan makeup.

Mrs. Smith's husband, Eugene, also taken to police headquarters, was released after making a statement. Detectives said they were convinced he had no knowledge of the abduction.

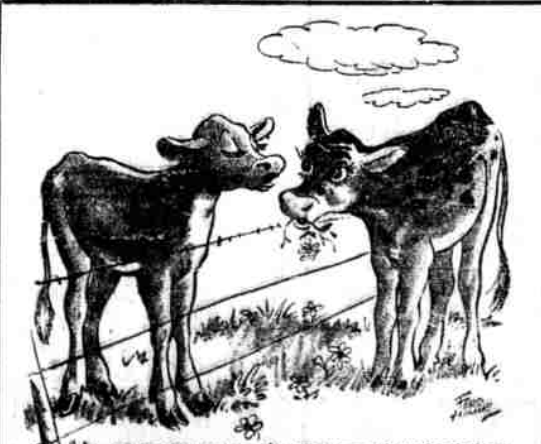
