"Forget-Me-Not" Campaign Dated In Douglas County

In many of the larger cities of Oregon, during the latter part of October, the Disabled American Veterans of the World War will hold their annual "forget-me-not" drives. The date for the campaign in Roseburg and Sutherlin is Saturday, October 21.

It is the hope of the committee of Dean-Perrine Chapter No. 9 of Roseburg, states R. L. Preston, that a substantial sum may be raised through the sale of forget-me-nots that the work of caring for disabled veterans may be carried on effectively. Last year's drive was as successful as the committee had hopes for, and they are hoping to have this year the biggest sale the chapter has ever held, Preston said.

"Back of the forget-me-not campaign is a most worthy purpose," the chairman declared. "While the immediate needs of disabled veterans are promptly and effectively taken care of, it is our rehabilitation program of services that we are greatly interested in. No matter how badly one of our comrades may be disabled, utterly incapacitating him, he lives in hopes of being restored to useful citizenship at some time. While he gratefully accepts the help we give him he looks forward to the day when he can again take his place in the working world and contribute his share to the general welfare. To finance the needs of this rehabilitation service the annual forget-me-not sale has been instituted. The very existence of the Disabled American Veterans organization and its services to the unfortunate participants in the World War, depends upon the success of these forget-me-not sales. Chairman Preston further stated that the Disabled American Veterans fund-raising ventures are not included in the Community War Chest drive being held at this time.
