Former State Senator Kiddle of Oregon Dies

LA GRANDE, Oct. 18. (AP)—Lyle Kiddle, 47, chairman of the Union county democratic central committee and manager of a milling company here, died here yesterday after a long illness.

A veteran of World war 1, Kiddle had served in the state senate, was a member of the commission representing Oregon at the San Francisco exposition, and had been identified with many state and local activities.

His widow, Helen, and son, Pvt. Robert Kiddle, serving in the European theater, survive, as well as his mother, Mrs. Adah Kiddle of La Grande and a brother, Clyde, of Corvallis.

Farm Loan Bond Holders To Get Full Payment

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 18. (AP)—George B. Guthrie, receiver for the Oregon-Washington joint stock land bank, said today that holders of farm loan bonds will receive more than 100 cents on the dollar.

Dividend checks to be mailed No. 1 will bring total payments to 100 per cent of outstanding bonds, Guthrie said. In addition, the receivership holds \$290,000 of assets still to be distributed.

PORTLAND, Oct. 18. (AP)—James M. Lewis, 25, McMinnville, was free today of a negligent homicide charge in the traffic death of Gerald Senake, 25, Hillsboro.

A circuit court jury acquitted Lewis yesterday after he testified he did not see Senake standing beside a double-parked truck in Portland last April.

Tonsilectomies Again Safe, Doctors Announce

The city health officer announced that tonsilectomies, avoided during the infantile paralysis danger, would be "relatively safe" after that date.

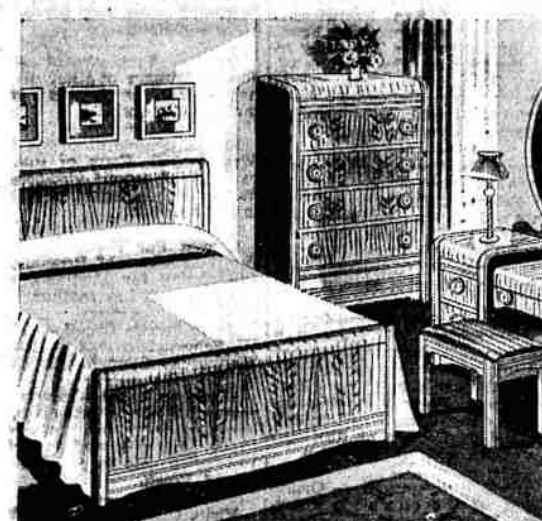

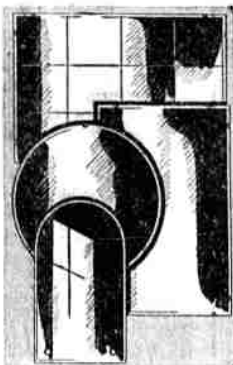

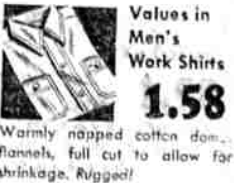
