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DOUBLE LIABILITY

MANY Oregon communities are suffering from lack of adequate banking facilities because the voters permit continuance of a law as obsolete and worthless as a Landon campaign button. Voters at the Nov. 7 election will have an opportunity to repeal that law and open the way for a sound and vigorous state banking system.

The first measure on the ballot—300-301—is a proposed amendment "to provide alternative means for securing bank depositors." Passage would, in effect, remove the requirement that stockholders in state-chartered banks in Oregon be liable for double the amount of their stock.

Through an act of congress, double liability on national bank stock was removed in 1935, following the organization of the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation which provides federal insurance for deposits up to \$5,000. Only three states still retain the obsolete law.

State banks organized prior to Nov. 5, 1912, are not now subject to double liability, but those chartered since that date are affected. Thus there is a decided inequality among the state banks.

Double liability was created as a means of protecting depositors. Since that function now is covered by federal deposit insurance, the double liability act serves only to keep cautious investors from purchasing stock in state-chartered banks. Their investments go into national banks from which congress has removed the liability.

This measure has previously been before Oregon voters but was rejected, partially because of suspicion of anything desired by financial interests and partly because of sad recollections of losses suffered during the depression period.

But continuation of this amendment upon our constitution serves, under present conditions, only to keep investors out of the state banking field and to deprive many communities of needed state banks.

A vote 300 X Yes, will, in our opinion, be a vote in the interest of progress and prosperity.

They have behind them strong leftist organizations which would be politically equipped to immediately push aside the hair-pulling bureaucrats and take over the government. Truman, plainly bewildered by his sudden elevation, owing his all to the most corrupt political machines in the country, could be nothing but a stooge.

Vets' Aid Through Forget-Me-Not Purchasing Urged

"Wear a Forget-me-not" will be the plea of dozens of workers on the streets of Roseburg and Sutherlin tomorrow, when the annual flower sale of Dean-Ferrine chapter, Disabled American Veterans, opens at 9 a. m. It will be an urge for the civic-minded citizens who have not forgotten their war-time promises, to wear the dainty little boutonniere, the flower of remembrance.

The campaign is being conducted by the chapter to raise funds to take care of emergency relief problems among the war-time disabled and to aid in the work of rehabilitation including that of maintaining a full time rehabilitation officer to serve as a special advocate or attorney-in-fact for disabled veterans.

The veterans organization is a congressionally chartered spokesman of, by, and for the disabled veterans.

"Our purpose," says R. L. Preston, chairman, "is to render a distinctive service to the war-time disabled comrades through the local chapters and the national organization. We take care of the immediate needs of the incapacitated veteran and his dependents. It should be known that of the world war veterans who receive compensation, for service connected disabilities, about 40 per cent receive less than \$30 per month, while the average is about \$45 per month. By securing for them a just compensation we relieve the community in which they may reside of an actual or possible burden, thus making these yearly drives a real community service."
