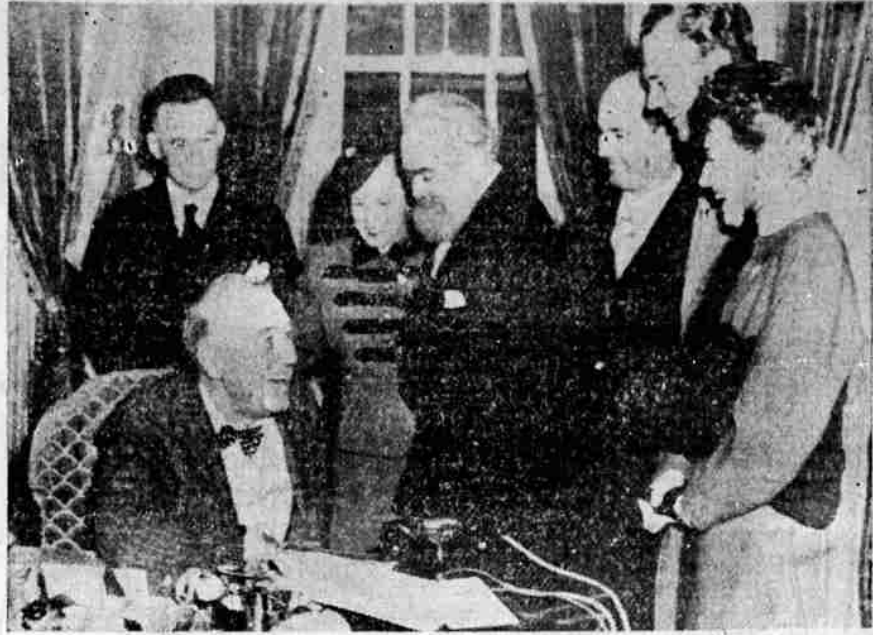

The plight of Chinese armies resisting the advance of Japanese forces in south central China is causing Allied high command considerable worry. Map above shows how Japs are steadily nearing their objective—to link forces coming down from the north with those driving up from Canton, to control entire length of Hankow-Canton railway. This would split Chinese forces, endanger Chungking, give Japs a continuous line of land communication from north China to Hong Kong. One of greatest setbacks for Allies was forced abandonment and destruction of U. S. 14th Air Force's major base at Kweilin.

Deer Hunters Face OPA Inquiry Into Use of Gasoline

PORTLAND, Oct. 20—(AP)—More than 300 Oregon deer hunters have a letter coming to them from the OPA, which is curious about the gasoline they used to get to hunting grounds.

Sol Stern, district enforcement officer, said that at least 329 of them will be asked to explain why their cars were far from home and how they got there.

Investigators took the numbers of all cars found in hunting areas. In the Klamath-Lakeview region, Stern said, 132 numbers were noted. Around Burns there were 66, and near John Day, 131.

Questions by investigators, Stern said, nearly all had good excuses to offer. Some were checking sawmills, others were looking for insurance prospects. One was selling wallpaper.

The letter these hunters will get, Stern explained, will ask them to appear before their local boards prepared to give a full explanation, and with evidence to support their story.

F. T. Andrews Dies At Coos Junction

Frank T. Andrews, 86, died this morning at the home of his daughter and granddaughter, Mrs. Florence Leatherman and Mrs. Blanche Haig, at Coos Junction, following prolonged illness. He was born at Freedom, Me., December 25, 1857, and was married to Miss Dora Ebert at Joliet, Ill., in 1878. Mrs. Andrews passed away in 1936. Later Mr. Andrews moved to California, from which state he came to Douglas county about five years ago to make his home. Mr. Andrews was a member of the Royal League lodge.

Surviving are four daughters and two sons: Mrs. Florence Leatherman, Coos Junction; Mrs. Jennie Miller, Gary, Ind.; Lester Andrews, Mrs. Alice Lyons and Mrs. Paul Nelson, Chicago, Ill., and Frank Andrews of Christina, Mont. He is also survived by 15 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas funeral home Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Masonic cemetery.

Wool Acceptance Period Extended to February 15

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20—(AP)—The commodity credit corporation will accept all pulled wool from animals slaughtered in 1944 if the wool is tendered before Feb. 15, 1945, Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) announced last night.

O'Mahoney, chairman of the senate special wool committee, said he had been advised earlier that slaughterers threatened to reduce prices paid for fat lambs

if they could not dispose of their wool within the slaughtering season. The CCC previously was to terminate its purchases on Dec. 31. The Wyoming senator also announced he had given assurance by Price Administrator Bowles that the lamb ceiling would be surveyed with a view of making adjustments to compensate for higher operating costs.
