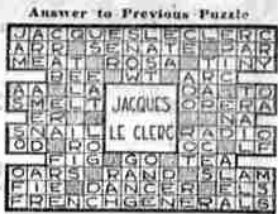

Perilous Air Service Over "Hump" Between India and China Related by Lieut. Virgil Sanders, on Leave Here

Lieutenant Virgil Sanders, who is on leave at his home in Roseburg, visiting with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Sanders, following 19 months flying "The Hump" between India and China with the Army Transport command, hopes his next assignment will take him to the South Pacific. Except for the gap from San Francisco to the China coast, he has circled the world by plane, and hopes to get an opportunity to close the gap.

Of course, the flying approximately 250,000 miles, he has covered distances which would have taken him ten times around the globe, but 154 missions and 1680 flight hours were over the most difficult flying terrain in the world, and in weather conditions where an average of only three out of ten flights were made in anything like decent flying weather.

There was, for instance, the time when "Virgie", as he is known to his friends and to the football and basketball fans who knew him so well as one of Roseburg high school's star athletes, was flying at 23,000 feet over the Salween river area, one of the roughest sections of the mountainous route. He was in dense clouds and flying entirely on instruments when both engines of his transport plane failed because of icing conditions.

Mountains were hidden in the clouds and at any moment the plane might crash into one of the hidden peaks as the ship glided down. At 17,000 feet Sanders ordered his crew to bail out. The men huddled around the transport doorway reluctant to leave, while the pilot was "sweating it out" up front. At 13,000 feet the plane broke out of the fog and Sanders found he was miraculously coasting down a valley with towering peaks on both sides. He immediately went into a gliding circle, looking for the parachutes of his crew, who should be drifting down. When he failed to see the chutes he looked back into the ship to find the men wide grins on their faces, still aboard.

At 9,500 feet one of the motors came to life and a few seconds later the other sputtered and resumed work. Following tortuous valley paths, Sanders flew his plane on to its destination with a cargo of vital materials for the
