problems. From Holland to Switzerland, there is rain-soaked mire and clouds at tree-top height — distinctly NOT offensive weather.

The Canadians are slowly squeezing the Germans out of the Antwerp area.

WE'RE doing well on Leyte. Tacloban, the island's principal town, falls to us, along with two adjacent airfields.

The "vicious Jap 16th division" (march of death on Bataan, etc.) is already in supply trouble, and MacArthur says more of it is in store for them.

OUR night reconnaissance planes drop incendiary bombs, starting more fires, at Balikpapan, in Borneo.

Watch Borneo, whose oil is of such high test that it can go directly from the wells into the fuel tanks of ships, without refining.

IF we can TAKE IT FOR OURSELVES, it will ease our Pacific supply problem immensely.

A Jap naval commentator, says via Tokyo radio that Japan WELCOMES our invasion of the Philippines because it "offers another opportunity to deal crushing blows at the mainstay of the enemy's (our) Pacific forces."

THE week's political sensation is the announcement by Senator Ball, Minnesota REPUBLICAN, that he will support Roosevelt for a fourth term on the basis of FOREIGN POLICY.

Ball, who is probably quite sincere, belongs to the fairly numerous group of Americans often referred to as the "intelligentsia" whose heads are so constantly in the rosy clouds of foreign policy that they are apt to lose sight entirely of DOMESTIC affairs.

THE Tokyo broadcast carrying this nonsense is BEAMED AT AMERICA, indicating that they want us to hear it!

IN Arctic Europe, the poor befuddled Finns, who by this time must be having trouble figuring out whom to shoot at, are helping the Russians drive the Germans NORTHWARD out of Finland.

BALLOT MEASURES IV AND V

THE fourth and fifth measures on your ballot are deserving of study. One is an amendment to authorize legislative regulation of the voting privilege forfeiture and the other would provide educational aid to veterans of World War II.

Oregon laws now provide that a person convicted of a felony loses his right of franchise permanently, regardless of his conduct after paying the penalty for his crime.

Although they have paid the penalty for their misdeeds, they are, under present restrictions, punished for the balance of their lives by being denied the right of franchise, except in cases where they are given a full pardon by the governor.

There is, of course, the argument that if a man obeys the law he will not be sent to the penitentiary. Then, too, there is possibility that some undeserving persons will be restored their right to vote through political pull or pressure.

But the modern technique in penal methods is toward rehabilitation rather than eking out the last measure of payment of the "debt to society," as was the case when this section was written into the state constitution in 1857.

The proposed amendment would make it possible for the legislature to set up procedure whereby a person convicted of a felony and who has served his sentence could have his full rights of citizenship restored. The legislature, if the measure is approved, doubtless will provide safeguards to assure that the person to whom the right of franchise is returned has demonstrated his desire and intention to "go straight."

Moral rehabilitation would be materially aided by passage of the proposed amendment.

The fifth measure is one which would provide a tax levy of two-tenths of a mill to provide limited educational aid to veterans of the current war. Like the proposed amendment which would grant loans to veterans for purchase of homes, farms and business property, this bill was referred to the people by the legislative assembly prior to passage by congress of the G. I. Bill of Rights.

A similar measure, which was enacted for veterans of the first World war, proved far more expensive than had been anticipated and additional appropriations were required. That experience indicates the proposed two-tenths of a mill tax levy is too low, if the state is to finance educational benefits for veterans.

There still is ample time for the legislature to reconsider the measure, fitting it into the congressional act through a revamping process.

It is our opinion that the proposal should be referred by the people back to the legislature, through a negative vote, and that if the legislature finds benefits in excess of those provided by congress are required, that the matter be adjusted on such basis with a tax ample to meet anticipated needs.

This is not the first time an inoffensive stooge (Truman) has been set up for the vice presidency. Both parties have done it, and it has given us some exceedingly variable results—Chester A. Arthur, Andrew Johnson, Theodore Roosevelt, Calvin Coolidge. Now and then the "VP" has turned out to be a person of surprising strength.

However, the only thing that stands out about Truman is UNUSUAL MEDIOCRITY. Truman's subservient attitudes indicate how far the Democratic party has become a ONE-MAN SHOW. Even the most rabid New Dealers must be worried about the possibility of this second-rater succeeding to the presidency—in times like these.

Truman is a pretty sorry offering. He is a "Sad Sack" of party politics.—Eugene Register Guard.

That answer would be more impressive if it weren't for the New Dealers' "what's the constitution between friends" attitude which makes a lot of us suspicious where otherwise we wouldn't be. The feeling that its promises can't be trusted is back of a lot of sincere opposition to the New Deal.

Split Ticket Voting in Oregon Is Permissible

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 24.—(AP)—Many persons, particularly newly registered citizens, have been given misinformation to the effect that they must vote for candidates of one party, rather than split their voting. Secretary of State Farrell said today. "Any voter, duly registered in Oregon, be he democrat or republican, can vote for candidates of the opposition ticket, either individually or as a whole. Split ticket voting is perfectly permissible in the election on November 7," he said. More than 41,000 applications for soldier ballots have been received by the State department, and 2500 federal ballots already have been cast by servicemen, Secretary of State Farrell said today.

Democrats Lead in Only Six Precincts

Republican Majority in Douglas County 2,312; Miscellaneous Lists 782

Democrats hold a lead in only six of Douglas county's 49 voting precincts, according to a tabulation compiled by County Clerk Roy Agee in announcing final registration figures for the coming general election, Nov. 7. Democratic precincts are Cow Creek, Gunter, East and West Reedsport, Loon lake and Winchester Bay. Republicans have a majority in all other precincts although the registration approaches the 50-50 mark in several communities, particularly Sutherlin, where there are 365 republicans to 339 democrats.

Total registration is 14,154, which includes 7,842 republicans and 5,530 democrats, giving the republicans a majority of 2,312 for the county as a whole. There are 782 voters registered as progressives, prohibitionists, socialists, independents and miscellaneous, the latter 648 in number, having no party affiliation.

Navy Trainees in Idaho May Battle Deer, Elk

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—(AP)—The navy stands ready to level its guns in defense of the embattled farmers of Hope, Idaho. The targets—if the order comes to fire—will be deer and elk which growers contend browse nightly in their gardens and eat away orchards. Aid from the Farragut, Idaho, naval training base to eliminate surplus animals was requested some time ago by Representative White (D., Idaho). Today White's office was informed by Commander F. H. Kelley of the Farragut base that navy trainees are ready for action.
