Housecleaning of Record Size Is Pledged by Dewey

EN ROUTE TO CHICAGO WITH DEWEY, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey headed for Chicago today to discuss "the moral issues of this election" after telling a Milwaukee audience that he would "conduct the finest, largest housecleaning in the history of the world" when he became president.

Speaking at Milwaukee from an automobile before a crowd estimated at 8,000 persons, the republican presidential nominee said that when he became president he would restore harmony between the executive and "the congress and would clean out 'the quarrelsome, wasteful, bungling' bureaucrats."

Gov. Dewey said that in 1940, after eight years in office, the new deal had nothing to show for its administration except an expenditure of fifty-eight billion dollars and eight million unemployed.

"You have earned something better than that," he added, "but the new deal offers you only four years more of itself."

Wisconsin's Record Praised. The street address came after Governor Dewey had met republican congressmen and aspirants to congressional posts and conferred briefly with Wisconsin party leaders. Earlier in the day he held a press conference at which he had declared that the nation's foreign policy was "too important to be made a matter of political controversy."

He also lauded labor in Wisconsin, declaring that it "had a great record of not one single major strike since the start of the war."

"Labor," he added, "has been told by the new deal that it is its only friend. Yet, after 12 years labor still has to contend with 25 different agencies, a department of labor that does not exist and still is buffeted from pillar to post."

At this conference Governor Dewey said he thought his definition of his foreign policy position in a Minneapolis speech last night was "so clear there is no possible question of the interpretation."

Gov. Dewey will deliver in Syracuse, N. Y., Saturday the farm speech originally scheduled to be given last night in Minneapolis.

Rationing Stressed as Barrier to Inflation

PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Today's price controls are assurance against postwar inflation and disastrous deflation, a Washington, D. C., OPA official declared today.

Sidney Johnson, OPA director of trade relations, appealed to local food dealers to explain to consumers the reasons for keeping food prices down.

"Consumer will inevitably feel a 'let-down' after 'V-E' day," he warned. "Rationing restrictions will become irksome. We want to get rid of them at the earliest possible moment, but not until the danger of inflation—and subsequent disastrous deflation—is past."

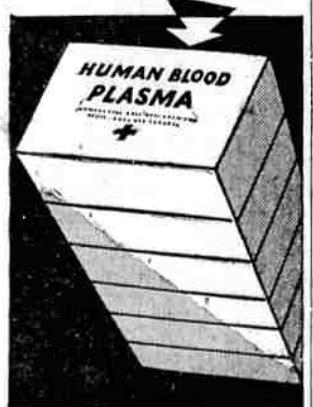
