(By ALDEN HARNESSE)

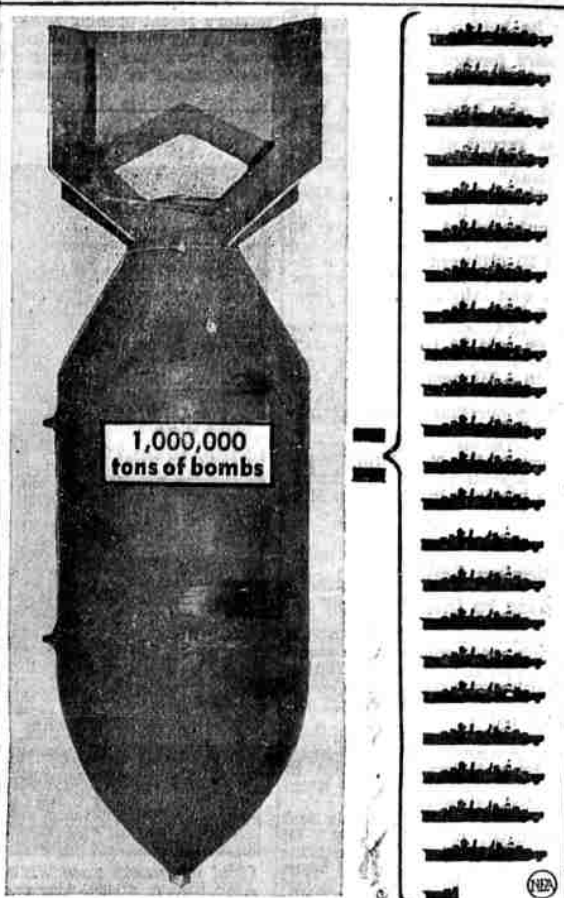
The gods of battle are revealing.

U. S. Navy pilots of Admiral Halsey's Third Fleet strike at Nichols Field on Manila Bay, where Japs, three years ago, caught American planes unprepared on the ground. 169 planes were destroyed in the air and 188 on the ground.

Why the Enemy Staggers



One million tons of bombs have fallen on the enemy since Pearl Harbor—a volume of explosives which, as shown on chart above, are equal to the combined weight of 22 and a quarter battleships of the 45,000-ton Iowa class. Almost half of the total has been dropped since D-Day in Europe, according to Gen. H. H. Arnold, AAF commander, who promises that the second million tons will fall "in only a fraction of the time required for the first."

COMMUNITY CLUB TO HOLD PARTY FRIDAY

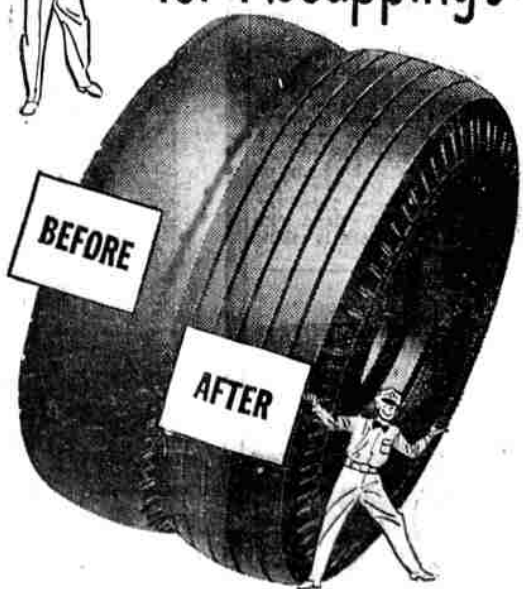

"Bootleg Market" in Cigarettes Is Budding

PORTLAND, Oct. 24.—(AP)—A budding "bootleg market" in cigarettes was predicted today by tobacco wholesalers here. Already, they said, potential

buyers had approached them with offers of as much as \$90 for a \$60 case of cigarettes. The solicitors were turned down, added the wholesalers, in favor of regular retail customers.

Tobaccoists repeated complaints against hoarders, partially blamed for the growing cigarette shortage. In one case a woman was seen pleading wistfully for cigarettes, then tossing the desired package atop some 60 other packs secreted in a shopping bag.
