WHAT it all adds up to is the SUPREME IMPORTANCE the Japs place upon our landing in the Philippines. In an effort to drive us out, they are willing to risk considerable units of their highly-treasured fleet.

WELL have to WAIT for the rest of the story. It may be a big one. Every time the Jap fleet, or important units of it, is lured out of hiding, the air fairly crackles with possibilities.

IN Holland, the British take 'S' Hertogensbosch, CUTTING the German escape route to the north over the Rhine channels. They used flamethrowers against German BAZOOKA nests.

ELSEWHERE on the western front, there is nothing particularly new. We and the British are building up strength for an offensive that will be launched whenever we are fully ready.

THE Russians are advancing steadily in Hungary and Czechoslovakia, but reports of their operations there are scanty and incomplete.

ON the eastern front the battle for East Prussia is raging on a front of 150 miles, from the mouth of the Niemen to the corner where East Prussia, Lithuania and Poland come together.

THE German high command announces officially that the Russians have sprung a powerful NEW offensive from the Narva river, north of Warsaw.

THE Russians are also cutting across the northern tip of Norway, and have taken Kirkenes, the submarine base from

SALUTE YOUR NAVY

TODAY is Navy day. It is a day set apart each year to pay tribute to "The Fleet" and to honor the devotion and heroism of its men, and women, and to consider the part played by the Navy as a branch of our armed might.

Never before in history has Navy day had the setting which marks this observance in the year 1944. Our Navy has given us reason for celebration. The crushing defeat of the Japanese fleet, one of the outstanding naval battles of all time, has brought great rejoicing.

The Navy's celebration of this day probably is being punctuated by the booming of big guns firing death into enemy ships and strongholds. Planes are leaving carrier decks to carry destruction to enemies who have defied our power and must today be sadly regretting their under-estimation of our naval genius.

This is, indeed, a great Navy day! Navy day was inaugurated October 27, 1922. The date has significance for two reasons. It marks the anniversary of the date in 1775 when the Continental Congress received the bill providing for creation of an independent fleet.

We have had ample occasion in the past few months to realize the importance of our Navy in the world conflict. Previous wars have been principally Army shows. One or two major naval battles have occurred in each of the wars of the past, but it has been the Army which has carried the brunt of actual fighting.

In the first World war our Navy had a monotonous task, being engaged principally in shepherding convoys, patrolling for enemy submarines and acting generally as a protective arm for our supply lines. But in the current war the Navy has been in almost constant combat action, not only in performing its function in guarding supply lines, but in carrying the fight to the enemy and in his own territory.

The sacrifices in the battle of Midway doubtless saved the Pacific coast from Japanese invasion and proved the genius of our naval leaders. Forced back from her thrust toward the Pacific coast, Japan has since felt our Navy gradually tightening the noose, which will at last strangle the life from the island empire.

The perfect unity between sea, ground and air forces has been little short of miraculous. The ingenuity shown in utilizing modern instruments of warfare, to augment naval strength, has astonished not only our enemies but has won highest admiration from our own population.

So today we pay tribute to our Navy and to the men and women who compose its personnel. Proud of tradition, they have set new records of heroism and devotion to duty as they successfully perform a task which has defied military minds of past ages, that of amphibious warfare.

And as we salute those who so proudly wear the uniform, we must not forget the millions of men and women who are at this moment producing the ships, arms and munitions which are making a glorious victory possible. Only through the miracle of production have we achieved the world's greatest naval might. The fact we are able to fight in all seven seas, not with one fleet but with many, is possible only because patriotic men and women have been toiling with intense fervor to build the ships, planes and guns which are blasting our enemies from the lands they would have placed under subjection and which carry the banner of freedom to peoples ground under the heels of evil tyrants.

Palestine Missionary To Speak in Roseburg



The Rev. Armin A. Holzer, D. D., above, a Palestine missionary, is to be a guest speaker in Roseburg Sunday, occupying the pulpit at the Pilgrim Holiness church at the 11 a. m. service and speaking at 3 and 7:45 p. m. at the Church of Nazarene.

Dr. Holzer is a graduate of the Louisville Baptist seminary and a member of the Interdenominational Evangelistic association of which the late Billy Sunday was one of the founders. He is general director of a far-reaching inter-church missionary movement on behalf of the evangelization of Palestine and world Jewry, known as the Palestine Prayer Fellowship, Inc.

The son of a noted Jewish rabbi, Dr. Holzer has crossed the ocean 40 times in carrying the Bible message to distant lands. In Palestine he directed a refuge mission school and other benevolent enterprises to relieve needy and persecuted Jews.
