Members of the association will be privileged to attend the concert.

Her beautiful voice, rich and warm in quality, and of phenomenal range, has delighted audiences all over the country and brought great success to Rose Bampton, as leading soprano of the Metropolitan Opera Association. Each year has seen her triumph in new places—Europe, England, South Africa, and this year it was at the famous opera house in Buenos Aires, Argentina, where she won new laurels.

Such beautiful singing, with floating tones, like the sound of violins and caressing in its haunting loveliness, opens up a world of new beauty in the music which she sings to music lovers everywhere, who fall under the magic spell of the mood she creates.

Miss Bampton received her early musical education in Cleveland and Buffalo and later graduated from the Curtis Institute, Philadelphia. She soon attracted wide attention when she appeared as soloist with the Philadelphia orchestra under the direction of Leopold Stokowski.

She made her Metropolitan debut on her 23rd birthday and from then on her career took on a national and international scope. Today she is a favorite with all of the leading symphony orchestras of America and Europe; she participates in outstanding musical festivals, is equally at home on the concert stage as before the microphone of leading radio programs, and in the sphere of opera she has already established herself firmly as one of America's greatest dramatic sopranos, a verdict corroborated by the acclaim of the musical centers of the world. She graces with her remarkable voice, her histrionic ability and her mastery of style such famous operas as "Aida," "Norma," "Otello"—Don Giovanni, "I Traviata," "Lohengrin," "Fanny Hansen," "Die Walkure," "The Masked Ball," "La Forza del Destino" and many others. Hers is a royal place in the realm of song.

U. S. Ammunition Bill Climbing Into Millions

BOSTON, Oct. 27. (AP)—Rear Admiral George F. Hussey, Jr., U. S. N., chief of the bureau of ordnance, said today that early in 1945 the United States navy will be expending 100 million dollars a month for rocket ammunition alone. He added that "the overall peak of ordnance expenditures will not be reached until the latter part of the first quarter of the coming calendar year. By that time our expenditures will be approximately 350 million dollars per month."

"Right now," he said, "we are expending approximately 100 million dollars per month for ammunition."

Mexican Port Dredged For British Naval Fleet

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 27. (AP)—A powerful British naval force is expected to visit the port of Acapulco in the near future, officials of the Navy department disclosed.

They said that in preparation for this visit the Bay of Acapulco has been dredged so as to accommodate vessels of great draft.

Thomas E. Dewey Says:

"How is it that the New Deal managed to make a three-year depression last nearly eleven years? Why, with all its borrowing and spending, with all its emergencies and unlimited powers, were there still 10,000,000 unemployed in the spring of 1940?"

"One of the most important reasons was that our present administration never once established a policy of encouraging people to do business. It never once had a stable policy that allowed people to make plans, to go ahead and carry them out. Our tax laws should be the most stable. They have been the most unstable. Consider just one startling fact. The New Deal changed our tax laws fifteen times in twelve years. It actually passed two revenue acts that were out of date before they could even go into effect, because new laws had been passed in the meantime."

"How in the world can people plan ahead when they don't know from one month to the next what their taxes are going to be?"

Political Rivals Trade Volleys On National Front

(By the Associated Press)

Governor John W. Bricker of Ohio, the republican vice presidential nominee, told an Enid, Okla., audience last night that "if the new deal wants to extend the wartime controls, it will find some authority in the language of statutes to do so, and besides it has a new deal attorney general and supreme court to help it."

But ex-Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the War Production Board said in a broadcast from Washington, "the president encouraged and supported the WPB policy of fair play for business."

"We used our powers sparingly and only for essential war purposes," Nelson said. "The president has the know-how for great leadership."

Remarks. The word businessmen dislike especially — "bankrupt" — once came into a radio debate at New York between Senator Ferguson

(R., Mich.) and Interior Secretary Ickes.

The new deal, said Ferguson, is "bankrupt in principle, bankrupt in policies, bankrupt in personnel." He said that "every time the new deal got its hands on a homefront job, that job was badly done."
