

Indians of R. H. S. Post 14-12 Victory Over Springfield

The Roseburg high school Indians turned in a 14 to 12 victory Friday over the Springfield Millers, although they nearly lost the contest after dominating play for the first three periods.

Coming into the final quarter with a lead of 14 to 0, the Indians were caught flat-footed by a Springfield passing attack and only the fact that James had kicked two conversions for extra points the first time the Indians have been able to convert after touchdowns this season, accounted for the victory.

The best blocking the Indians have produced this season occurred on the evening kick-off when Harrison took the ball on his own 15-yard line and ran 85 yards to score, while his teammates took the Millers out of the play by downfield blocking ahead of the ball carrier. The Indians punched deep into Springfield territory several times during the first half, once reaching the 5-yard line, only to lose the ball on a fumble.

Early in the third period the Indians started another march down the field and reached the 12-yard line from which point James scored on an end-around play.

James kicked from placement to win the extra point after each touchdown.

Completely stunned on the ground, the Millers took to the air in the last seven minutes of play and nearly snatched the victory away from the Indians. Like and Clifton, rushing to Redmore and Albright, completed 11 out of 22 pass attempts. Redmore and Albright each scoring one of the Miller touchdowns. Passes failed to click, however, for the extra points.

Roseburg gained possession of the ball for the last two minutes of play.

The Indians made a net gain of 173 yards from rushing as compared to 67 yards by Springfield, but completed only one out of nine passes for a gain of five yards, losing the ball twice by interceptions, while Springfield made a total of 215 yards from passes. Roseburg made 10 first downs and Springfield eight.

Past Defense Weakens

Coach Mel Ingram, while pleased by the victory, was dissatisfied with the breakdown of the Roseburg pass defense, which functioned brilliantly in the preceding game against Cottage Grove.

The Roseburg line, although outgaining the Springfield forward wall, missed many tackles. Caskey was outstanding in line play, and Seillon was the principal ground gainer in the backfield.

The next contest for the Indians will be a home game against Ashland, Friday, Nov. 3.

time years of the new deal in 1940.

"Despite our war prosperity," the governor said, "millions of families in America do not get enough of the right things to eat. We still have further to go. We must never go back to the scarcity theories and shrinking economy of the new deal years.

"We must go forward and develop the great American market for our farm products through improved diet for the American people. If we can keep set on this objective we shall need, not a reduction, but an increase in food production, but an increase in food back to those dismal days in the middle age of the new deal when two families out of five in America were living at the undernourished level of less than \$20 a week.

Regimentation Target

Charging the administration with "attempts at increased regimentation by new deal theorists in Washington," Dewey said the nation should be committed to the proposition that the prices of major farm products must be supported against the substandard levels we saw for so many years before this war.

"It took a war to get decent farm prices, just as it took a war to get jobs," he declared.

Declaring President Roosevelt often put "two men in one job," the candidate said the executive order which had given the secretary of agriculture and the food administrator coequal powers had caused the country to lose "a first class man" in Chester Davis, food administrator Davis, he said, resigned with the statement that he had—and here Dewey quoted—"assumed a public responsibility while the authority, not only over broad food policy, but day-to-day action, is being exercised elsewhere."

supporting Gen. MacArthur's landing, before they were beaten back.

The basis of the action was "never give a sucker an even break." Associated Press War Correspondent Spencer Davis reported after interviewing Admiral Oldendorf. The Japanese were "suckers" for entering the narrow, twisting straits.

The admiral placed his cruisers and destroyers on either flank and threw his battle line of two Pearl Harbor battleships square across the strait off Port Hingutun, some 30 miles inside the entrance.

"Dream" Realized

American battleships, commanded by Rear Adm. George Llewellyn, opened up with heavy salvos from 16,000 to 17,000 yards. Oldendorf said "it was the sort of naval battle you dream about. We completely crossed their 'T.' The Japanese were hit with high caliber guns after a smashing torpedo attack.

"At one time eight enemy ships were burning simultaneously," Oldendorf related. "One large cruiser which we believe was a battleship, with two destroyers alongside, was making 11 knots when one of our battleships landed a salvo directly on the target. All three ships sank."

their positions from the Scheide to Tillyer. Associated Press War Correspondent William F. Bond commented from the field, and the campaign has become a race to reach the Meuse bridges.

On the eastern sector of the allied effort into Holland, the Germans struck back at American armor in the Venlo sector, and took the town of Meijel north of the Roermond-Woert railway. A British staff officer said the enemy threw in 30 tanks into this fight.

Borden On Zoom was the fourth major stronghold in the German line to fall in three days.

Elements of eight German divisions were pulling back along the southwestern Dutch front, and remnants of two more were cut off at the Scheide estuary.

Front reports said the enemy might yield all of western Holland, including the cities of Rotterdam, Amsterdam and the Hague.

Trapped Nazis Mauled

Along the south bank of the Scheldt, the survivors of the trapped German 54th division were being hammered into submission and the Canadians had pushed to within little more than a mile of Cadzand, one of the last remaining Nazi strongholds. In one day, Canadians took 600 more prisoners, raising the total in that operation to 5,922, at a cost of 14 casualties.

"During the school year 1943-44, American Junior Red Cross members produced more than 12,000,000 comfort and recreational articles for servicemen here and abroad, bringing the grand total of such items produced since Pearl Harbor to 25,000,000."

The report continued to state, from a letter written by Albert A. Scott, Red Cross general supply officer in the South Pacific: "Perhaps the most appreciated of all Red Cross holiday gifts were those prepared by members of the American Junior Red Cross in towns all over America. Almost everyone had a note enclosed in a childish scrawl, written to the receiver. The greatest thrill I've had over here yet came at Milne Bay when I saw the satisfaction on the soldiers' faces as they opened a package and read their notes."
