Mariana Island Compared With Douglas Phases

The Mariana Island bears, in some respects, a resemblance to Oregon, according to Ralph W. Sanstede, seaman first class, of Roseburg.

"This island sort of reminds me of Oregon, as it is quite mountainous and everything is nice and green," Sanstede writes in a letter to the News-Review. "Most of the mountains have trees on them and are very irregular."

But the resemblance ends there, Seaman Sanstede reports, for there is a great difference in the type of weather.

"It rains here about 15 times a day," he states. "During the day it gets very warm and as the sun sets the temperature drops quickly. By early morning you can use a blanket very comfortably."

"The mosquito is our worst pest. Then there are land crabs, sand fleas and thousands of frogs. The lizards here are of an unusually large family. Some are four feet long. I have seen only one of these since I have been here. There are a large number of banana trees and lots of sweet potatoes. The bananas are not very large but they are very tasty."

Sanstede, who receives the News-Review, and reports "it sure helps me to read what is happening at home. There are quite a few fellows from Oregon and we all take turns reading the paper."

Roosevelt Quoted In Borah's Notes On War Danger

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—President Roosevelt was quoted in personal notes of the late Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, as saying in July of 1939 that if the war came in Europe and "if we could not do that which would avoid war, we must go in."

Borah's notes were made public by his widow because, she said, of the president's references to Senator Borah in his foreign policy speech last week. Mr. Roosevelt reported that Borah had said "his own private information from abroad was better than that of the state department" and that there would be no war in Europe.

The notes dealt with a White House conference July 18, 1939 on revision of the neutrality act. Mr. Roosevelt asked leading members of the senate foreign re-

lations committee to the White House.

Written in the third person, the Idaho republican's notes related his recollection of what transpired at the conference. He quoted Mr. Roosevelt as saying that he thought there was "great danger ahead and that he as president of the United States, wanted to be prepared to do our part in preventing war or meeting the situation should war come."

The notes also said with reference to the president: "He made it clear, however, that he did not minimize the fact that we might be called upon to take part in the war and that we must be prepared to take our part when the time came; that if we could not do that which would avoid war, we must go in."

Reconstruction Of Greece Still Calls for Help

"The great struggle of the Greek people, which began four years ago today when Mussolini's forces attacked at dawn, is still far from ended, despite liberation of the country," Oscar Broneer, executive vice-president of the Greek War Relief association, said today in a message directed to George Tralapis of Roseburg, Douglas county chairman for the association.

Greeks throughout the United States are making a nationwide observance today of the fourth anniversary of the Italian attack, which started Oct. 28, 1940. A nation-wide broadcast was presented last night commemorating the attack and celebrating the nation's liberation.

"Today the Greek people begin their long and difficult period of reconstruction with at least 1,300 of their villages and towns destroyed, their clothes in rags and their health impaired," Broneer, stated in his message. "The Greek War Relief association will continue in the future, as it has in the past, to supplement the aid being provided Greece by government agencies."

4-Year Marine "Cruise" Opened to 17-Year-Olds

PORTLAND, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Seventeen-year-olds may now enlist in the regular marine corps for four-year hitch, Maj. Norris E. Lineweaver, recruiting officer for Oregon and southern Washington, disclosed today.

Enlistment for the duration

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and six months is permitted, but the four-year "cruise" for 17-year-olds was granted in answer to many appeals for "career" enlistments.

Formerly only the short-hitch enlistment was open to this age group.

T-B Exam Tour Slated

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30.—(AP)—The Tuberculosis association's traveling equipment, capable of handling 1200 examinations a week, will begin a state-

wide tour next month to detect possible tuberculosis sufferers.
