Passage Across Arctic Top Made In Single Season

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 31.—(Canadian press)—The first voyage ever completed in a single season through the treacherous northwest passage across the Arctic top of America was triumphantly completed here Monday by the little Royal Canadian mounted police schooner St. Roch.

The voyage, the third successful voyage in history through the route charted by Roald Amundsen. The famous Norwegian explorer laid out the course in a 36-month voyage from 1903 to 1906, sailing from east to west.

Japanese Lunge Nearer Kweilin

CHUNKING, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Japanese troops advancing on a wide arc against Kweilin, defensive pivot of southeast China, have hammered to within six miles east, six miles northeast and nine and one-half miles south east of the Kwangsi province capital, the Chinese acknowledged tonight.

The Chinese continued attempts to disrupt enemy supply and communications lines, the high command said, with counterattacks toward the important town of Tunguan on the Hunan-Kwangsi railway, 90 miles northeast of Kweilin. The defenders claimed capture of one stronghold about four miles northwest of Tunguan and another 12 miles northeast of it.

On the Salween river front in Yunnan province, the Chinese said all positions except one stronghold three miles north east of Mangshih were taken in the area of Mangshih astride the Burma road, in a daylight attack supported by American bombers.

WHO WON'T PLAY?

PERSONS planning to vote for the New Deal presidential candidate at the coming election should think very seriously of the relationship that will exist between President Roosevelt, if reelected, and the congress. Many vital problems must be solved during the ensuing four years.

President Roosevelt in his speech at Philadelphia Friday night touched upon this situation. He said: "Some republican politicians are stating that the republicans in congress would cooperate with a republican president in establishing a world organization for peace—clearly intimating that they would not cooperate toward the same end in the event of a democratic victory."

Let's analyze his statement. Republicans, he states, have intimated that their party will not cooperate in congress if he is reelected. But can anyone remember when President Roosevelt has ever made any effort whatsoever to cooperate with congress?

The President from his first inauguration has endeavored to discredit congress in the minds of the people. He has attempted to make the legislative arm of government impotent.

"For 12 years I have carried to the best of my ability the flag of Franklin Delano Roosevelt," Senator Alben Barkley, democratic majority leader shouted to a cheering senate last Feb. 23 when he rose in revolt against the President's insulting message accompanying the veto of the tax bill. Barkley declared:

"I venture to say that I have carried the flag over rougher territory than was ever traversed by any majority leader. Sometimes I have carried it with little help here on the senate floor and more often with less help from the other end of Pennsylvania avenue."

Senator Doughton, democrat, of North Carolina, who joined Barkley in the revolt, declared that the President's veto message reflected "on the judgment and integrity of the Congress of the United States."

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 31.—(AP)—Barring unforeseen difficulties within the next few weeks, about 98 per cent of Oregon's food crops will be harvested this year despite the farm labor shortage.

Henry Olsen, Moit's democratic opponent, has six years legislative service behind him. He is a Columbia county farmer, and has been active in work for farm and labor organizations.

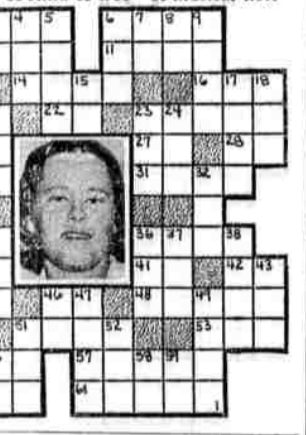
