ERIE, Pa., Nov. 1.—(AP)—Three Kentuckians hold the honor of casting the first civilian votes of the general election in Erie county. The out-of-staters, using absentee ballots, told reporters they voted for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey for president. They asked that their names be withheld.

Atty. Gen. Neuner, Treasurer Scott Face Opposition

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 1.—(AP)—The races for treasurer and attorney general are the only contests for statewide offices in Oregon's general election.

Three supreme court positions will be filled, but the incumbents who seek them are unopposed. They are Chief Justice J. O. Bailey and Justices Hall S. Lusk and Arthur D. Hav.

State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott, Portland republican, is seeking his second term, his opponent being W. T. Lambert, Portland democrat.

Scott has a long record of public service, having been U. S. marshal and chairman of the state highway commission before he became treasurer. He is now owner of the Portland Oregonian. Lambert's principal argument on why Scott should be ousted is that Oregon's 275,000 democrats should be represented on the board of control, which consists of three republicans. He is a business man and advocates better care of inmates of state institutions.

Neuner vs. Spaulding. George Neuner, republican attorney general, was appointed last year to succeed the late I. H. Van Winkle. Neuner is a former U. S. district attorney, and owns a brume orchard near McMinnville.

His democratic opponent is 38-year-old Bruce Spaulding, Salem attorney, who gained fame when, as Polk county district attorney, he prosecuted and convicted Al Rosser, head of Oregon's AFL teamsters, for conspiracy to burn a non-union West Salem box factory. Spaulding came within 8,000 votes of beating Van Winkle in 1940.

The new legislature will consist mostly of veterans, and will be overwhelmingly republican. Eleven circuit judges will be elected, but there is only one const. that being in Multnomah county for the seat vacated by the death of the late Judge Robert Tucker. Candidates are Franklin C. Howell, who was appointed to serve in Tucker's place until election; District Attorney James R. Bain, and District Judge John R. Mears. Twenty-seven counties will elect district attorneys; but there are contests only in Clackamas, Coos, Gilliam, Harney, Wasco and Wheeler counties. District attorneys in 20 of the 27 counties are unopposed for re-election.

RHS Indians Gird For Tough Foe in Ashland Lithians

The Roseburg Indians, flushed by victory in their last two games, are preparing to meet the Ashland Lithians at Finlay field Saturday night. The Lithians will compose one of the toughest teams the Indians have faced to date and Coach Mel Ingram, after scouting the Ashland team in the game they lost to Marshfield, 19 to 13, has been working hard to improve the Roseburg defensive tactics.
