Roseburg Indians, Improved, Ready to Take on Ashland

The Roseburg high school Indians are in fine fettle for Friday night's football game against the Ashland Lithians at Finlay field. Mel Ingram, coach, reported today.

"We're beginning to show a real liking for football," Ingram said, "and we're running and hitting harder than ever before."

Due to inexperience, Ingram said, the Indians in previous games have not been as aggressive in physical contact as the coach desired, but recently have been showing a liking for hitting hard.

A great deal of time has been given this week to speeding up the running attack and improving the pass defense.

The team has been showing a very marked improvement since training rules were made more effective. Ingram stated. Earlier in the season, many of the players were keeping late hours and were not in condition to play a full game at top speed. But, with cooperation of parents, violations of training rules have decreased and are showing a very remarkable improvement in physical condition and stamina.

For Has Weight Margin

Friday night's game is expected to be one of the toughest of the season, to date, as the Ashland team is slightly heavier than the Roseburg outfit and has a very fast backfield and a tricky style of offense.

Ingram is particularly pleased by the way his sophomores and juniors are performing, giving promise of a strong nucleus of experienced players for next year. Carter and Marsters, he reports, are already giving Caskey and Moteschbacher, regular guards, a hard race for starting positions at the guard spots, while Walker is showing up well at tackle. Scallon, a junior, is a regular at fullback, while Benson, center; Colver, back; Ullrich, Moore, Niblett, Atterbury, ends; James, back; Marsters, Landers.

Sullivan, linesmen, and others are all prospective material for next season, Ingram said. All have had some experience in games, and will be used frequently during the balance of the season.

Attendance at Friday night's game will be sponsored by the Lions club, and members of that organization will occupy a reserved section in the stands.

The R. H. S. Pop club will furnish entertainment between halves.

Ethyl Gasoline Inventor Dies of Strangulation

COLMBUS, O., Nov. 2.—(AP)—Thomas Midgley, Jr., 55, the inventor of Ethyl gasoline, was found dead in bed today at his home in nearby Worthington.

He had been an invalid and confined to a wheel chair for four years.

Midgley, who was credited with more than 100 patents, was stricken with infantile paralysis in 1940 and lost the use of his legs.

Sheriff's deputies said he apparently had been strangled in his sleep by a harness he had invented to help himself in and out of bed.

He is survived by his widow, a daughter and a son.

Truck Kills Boy On His Way to Buy Comic Book
