In the Day's News (Continued from page 1) esting as their actual presence there—betraying Japan's EXTREME nervousness over air raids on its congested cities, following the pattern that has been set in Germany.

EUROPEAN dispatches relate that in four days 10,000 tons of bombs have been dropped on the German city of Cologne.

That carries no reassurance for the worried Japs. It merely diagrams for them what we can do to their cities when we get good and ready.

A brief dispatch tells us that American bombers, coming from India, have attacked Hanoi, in French Indo-China (Jap-conquered). That MIGHT be significant.

Hanoi is on the lone line of railroad that reaches clear around to Singapore, and is now UNBELIEVABLY important to the Japs since they no longer have navy enough to hold the South China sea route to the East Indies.

Over most of its length, it runs close to the seashore and will be open to constant attack by our planes as soon as our carriers can safely operate in the South China sea.

A railroad also runs from Hanoi up to Kunning, which is one of our principal air bases in China. The Japs may be starting something in that direction.

THE brief glimpse we gained of conditions in China when the veil of censorship was pulled aside for a moment was not comforting, but neither was it surprising. We had been pretty sure for some time that a screw is loose there.

No realistic American thinker has been expecting any help of consequence from China, which is obviously weak to the point of practical impotence.

The official pretense that China is one of the BIG FOUR of the United Nations has been threadbare for quite a while—plainly so since the Chinese were pushed out of the last Quebec conference.

THE nub of the Chinese situation seems to be Chiang Kai-Shek's failure (perhaps refusal) would be a more accurate word) to get together with the northern communists, who constitute a powerful faction with armies of their own.

There is plenty of evidence that Russia is sympathetically interested in the Chinese communist group. It is just barely possible that the Chungking government's snubbing of the communists may

WE WONDER WHY. "I still know that the fate of America cannot depend upon any one man. * * * I, for one, shall remember that, even as President." — F. D. R., Nov. 5, 1932.

"We can keep out of war if those who watch and decide have a sufficiently detailed understanding of international affairs." — F. D. R., Aug. 14, 1936.

"How happy we are that circumstances permit us to put our money into bridges, etc., * * * than in vast supplies and implements of war." — F. D. R., Oct. 5, 1937.

We are seeking a general reduction of armaments and through this the removal of the fear of invasion and armed attack." — F. D. R., May 7, 1933.

"I cannot approve, nor would I be willing to submit to the Senate of the United States, any new treaty calling for larger navies." — F. D. R., Oct. 5, 1934.

"We should repeal immediately those provisions of the law that compel the federal government to go into the market to purchase, to sell, to speculate in farm products, in a futile attempt to reduce farm surpluses." — F. D. R., July 2, 1933.

"We advocate an immediate and drastic reduction of governmental expenditures by abolishing useless commissions and offices, consolidating departments and bureaus, and eliminating extravagance, to accomplish a saving of not less than 25 per cent in the cost of federal government." — F. "The treasury is all right and we are balancing the budget—you needn't worry." — F. D. R., Oct. 3, 1937.

be one of Russia's reasons for staying so carefully OUT of the war with Japan.

We may be attempting to bring Russia in by bringing pressure on Chiang to take in the communists (and he may be resisting because of fear that the Chinese communists will TAKE HIM IN instead).

ALL this is mere guesswork, justified only by the fact that when our government will tell us nothing we HAVE to guess.

BEFORE jumping on the Chinese TOO hard, we should also remember that we have been feeding them heavily with promises but NOTHING MUCH ELSE. An exclusive diet of promises is apt to grow tiresome.

IN Holland, we are closing in on Watcheren island, where a few remaining German big guns still command the entrance to the great port of Antwerp. Canadians are landing there today and seem to be making good progress.

The Germans are evidently convinced that they have held us out of Antwerp as long as they can and are moving OUT to the north over the lower Rhine channels. They apparently plan to establish a new line on the north bank of the northernmost of these channels.

THE Russians are reported only 43 miles from Budapest.

Red Star, the Russian army newspaper, says the Budapest offensive is now three days old and has broken a 60-mile gap in the defenses where the Germans had concentrated up to 20 anti-tank guns to the mile (more than one

per block). The reds are also driving on Budapest from the northeast, through Czechoslovakia.

This thrust is reported to be 120 miles from Budapest.

THE political war on the home front is nearing its final end getting bitterer with each day that passes.

By and large, this bitterness is a good sign, rather than a bad one, indicating that people are taking a real and personal interest in the important issues that are involved.

Roseburg, Ashland Grid Teams Set For Battle Tonight

The Roseburg high school Indians were prepared today to meet the strong Ashland Grizzlies in a football game on Finlay field starting at 8 o'clock tonight. Heavy rains have made the field very wet and slippery, which is expected to add to the difficulties of both teams in offense.

The Grizzlies count on a fast running combination in the backfield. The condition of the playing surface will make it very hard for the fast Ashland backs to get under way. If the Roseburg line charges hard and fast, as it is capable of doing, the Ashland running plays will be in danger of being broken up before they can get under way.

On the other hand, the Indians have not been overly proficient this season in ball handling, and will be apt to fumble a slippery ball unless they use much caution. As the Indians depend more upon power than speed in offense, they will be less handicapped than the Grizzlies, it is believed, in their running plays.

Attendance at tonight's game is sponsored by the Lions club, which will occupy a reserved section in the stands. The Lions have arranged a noise parade to precede the game, and will present a six-man football contest between halves of the main game.
