MAKE YOUR OPINION COUNT

TOMORROW millions of Americans will go to the polls in the most critical election of our history. But millions will stay at home. Certainly it is not asking too much when we urge every eligible person to VOTE at a time when so many of our young men and women are in battle lines offering their lives as a sacrifice to the ideals to which this government is dedicated.

We have been extremely critical of our present administration. We have expressed, as vigorously as we know how, our antipathy to the New Deal. But, if a light vote favors the Republican party and a heavy vote favors the New Deal, as some observers contend is the case, we still plead for a heavy vote.

We believe the New Deal offers only BAD government because it is dishonest, exhausted, power-inflated, wasteful, extravagant and inefficient. It is dishonest because it strives for power by trickery, division, prejudice, class hatred, misrepresentation, alliance with evil forces, or by any means which will produce votes; because it poses as a friend of soldiers when its first act upon assuming office was to cut \$450 million from veterans benefits and has since vetoed nearly a score of bills passed by congress to aid veterans; because it poses as a friend of labor while restricting labor's rights.

It is exhausted because it has produced nothing worth while since its first term. EVERY president comes into office with new ideas. But usually he has completed his program by the time he has been in office six years.

It is power-inflated because it has raided the law-making branch of government of legislative power and has set up autocratic bureaus and agencies to impose regimentation upon the people and proposes to continue those powers. It is wasteful and extravagant because it has, in addition to war expenditures, continued unnecessary experimentation and pump-priming, building up a political machine of federal employees.

It is inefficient in that it has divided the people into classes and groups. It has failed, except for the period of the war emergency, to solve problems of employment except through "made" work. It has kept the nation in a state of domestic confusion. Furthermore, the New Deal is dangerous. Dangerous in the fact that it is gambling the welfare of the country upon the physical condition of one man. Its candidate for vice-president is completely lacking in presidential qualification.

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The New Deal is evasive. It has answered criticisms only with sneers, invective, ridicule and wisecracks. It has misled people to believe it was responsible for war production and unity, when any person, who will stop to think, well knows this country would have been united in war under the leadership of ANY president. The New Deal is weak. Forced into a frantic defense, it has offered nothing but the personality of one man, a man forced to campaign in the "usual" sense, because he, and he alone, was all that could save the crumbling defenses.

These are only a few of the reasons why we oppose the New Deal. In these we are honest and sincere. We may be unduly prejudiced and alarmed. You have as much right to your opinions as we have to ours. We expect to vote our opinions. You have the same privilege. You may differ from us in your political views or you may agree with us. Whatever your opinion may be, make it count! VOTE!

Air Medal Given Lt. Wm. J. Cook

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England: First Lieutenant William J. Cook, of College Park, Ga., has recently been awarded the air medal for meritorious achievement in aerial combat. Lt. Cook pilot on the B-17 Flying Fortress "Half Pint", has completed ten daylight bombing assaults against the Nazi war machine in Germany. He is the 28-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Cook, of College Park. His wife, Mrs. William Cook, lives at Oakland, Oregon. Prior to his entrance into the AAF on Jan. 19, 1943, Lt. Cook was a student at the United States Military Academy, West Point, New York. He has been serving in the European theater of operations since Aug. 1, 1944.

ARGUES IN BEHALF OF LITTLE TOWNSEND BILL

Editor News-Review: It has been said that the little Townsend bill (316) initiative measure would not work. We arise to ask why? We seem to sense a feeling that a 60-year-old person is not necessary to the safe conduct of our civilization and society. Well—just who then are we? Aren't we the people who gave to that society the radio, the automobile, movie machines, electric light, power and all those gadgets common to the household? The electric motor, the internal combustion engine, the airplane, submarine and others too numerous to mention, none of which were here when many of us came. So we must have had an active part in their development. Speaking of electric motors, it costs approximately six cents per hour per horse power (746 watts) to operate that power. Converted into mechanical energy, it would perform at the rate of 33,000 foot pounds per minute or one pound lifted 33,000 feet high in one minute or its equivalent. It compares with the combined energy of 10 average men working at the same job on an hour basis. But to continue through an eight-hour shift, we find the human element cannot compare with the motor for the reason men must take time out periodically, while the motor continues, never ceasing, day after day. If we work full time, we will need 30 men on 3 shifts. But the little \$75 or \$100 motor grinds on. So naturally the motor gets the job and 30 men get their time checks and proceed to find employment elsewhere. When this machine age was developing, we older ones knew full well then what the result would be. But we had faith in a civilized society adjusting matters to a new condition. In this it seems we were wrong. However, I have faith yet that we will continue to keep the improvements we have developed and the 30 men too. Perhaps if the users of those improvements would "divvy" with us, everything would again be all right. We feel since we contributed those conveniences we should be considered in the new adjustment that should be made and the 60-60 bill 316 voted the law will do that.
