Government Sets Prices For New Buy of Onions

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—(AP)—An additional 105 carloads of the northwest's onion crop will be purchased immediately by the War Food administration.

Forty-five carloads will be purchased in Idaho, 45 in Oregon and 15 in Utah, the WFA said, at prices of 90 cents per 50-pound sack for No. 1 grade, and 85 cents per sack for onions listed as 90 per cent of No. 1.
